## **Introduction**

With a glowing happiness we are completing our Silver Jubilee year. The intervening twenty five years have proved our sincerity, honesty & integrity in fighting Poverty, Ignorance & Apathy. Now the battle has got world acceptance in the form of achieving Millennium Development Goals. We have readily agreed with the targets & eagerly participating in achieving the targets. But the battle has become more complex & serious.

Many friends raised doubts in our targets & progress. We had the conviction in our decisions. We did say, following Galileo Galilee “*E pur si monve*” – still the earth is moving.

Our faith sustained as the proof we add that we could raise adequate fund to meet our expenditures of ever rising tasks. Our fragile mud hut became 36 roomed Ananda Kendra.

The Market at Atghara has now more than two hundred shops. But when we started twenty five years ago, Atghara had no Market at all! Mud huts are less, many houses are brick built in Atghara.

Our Panchayat has received Presidential Award of “Nirmal Gram” (Clean Village).

Our area is almost a citadel of communal harmony.

Late Pannalal Dasgupta, the veteran freedom fighter & the renowned Educationist Dr. Triguna Sen offered their guidance & blessings to us.

Masanubu Fukuoka, the world renowned Organic Agriculturist also stayed in our village for nearly a month long period & appreciated our agricultural initiatives.

Our Project Vikas Kendra got a new dimension in the form of the Project Manab Jamin in Birbhum district. This expansion gave SEVA a recognition as state level organization.

Now, let us read together our departmental reports of both the projects systematically.

## AGRICULTURE

The only way to win over the battle against hunger is to expand our agriculture productivity. Our country is fortunate to have good water resources, reasonable good rainfall & a hard working farming population.

A National Sample Survey Study says 40% of the farmers want to leave farming. It is important cum urgent reverse this situation. We need a large number of educated young people to go in to farming using science and new eco-technology. We have all the necessary ingredients for progress. But the gap between scientific know how and field level know-how is large.

We at Vikas Kendra are fully aware of the situation and are trying to look for alternatives whenever possible. Some of these steps are :

### 1) **Zero Tillage Crop Cultivation**

The soil quality has degraded because of intensive cultivation with high external inputs. Previous trend is being reversed by this method where no inputs are used for cultivation. The Bio-village project at Dwipmedia is an example. Regularly 65 families are practicing this method in about 1.3 hectors of land. Furthermore more than 200 women farmers from 19 villages are producing various vegetable following this system.

### 2)a) **Relay Cropping Vegetables**

Two or more vegetables are cultivated at the same we utilise the nutrition available from the soil at different level.

### b) **Relay Crop Field**

In this method a new crop like pulse, spice or oil seed are shown before the main crop of Aman rice is harvested. About 185 numbers of farmers have adopted this method on 26.5 hectors of land and got good result.

### 3) **Companion Cropping**

Leafy vegetables can be grown along with some other vegetable like brinjal to utilise the nutrition available from the soil.

### 4) **Nutritional Garden**

This is similar to kitchen garden. Here all the available land however small may be, please used for cultivation of some vegetable or other.

### 5) **Medicinal Plant**

Justified use of medicinal plant can act as very strong preventive before the villagers search for external medical help. We have been emphasising on this activity right from the day of our inception. The first step is to teach the rural women to identify these plants. The next step would be to repair a list of the available medicinal plant in this area. Then they are taught how to cultivate these plants. The programme is gaining popularities quite very fast.

### 6) **Coconut Cultivation**

Coconut is one tree whose all the parts are economically useful for the farmers.

Coconut Development Board, the promoting agency for this programme has lot of schemes to support

coconut cultivation. We have arranged training of Self Help Group Members to teach them production of various value added items – both food & non-food. Now we are trying for regular marketing channels through Organic Bazar activities supported by IIRD.

Coconut Cultivation is a very disorganised activities in West Bengal villages. Unlike in Kerala, Tamil Nadu, & even Orissa. We have been able to develop a small nursery in our campus with good quality of local nuts. The seedlings have been distributed amongst 29 local farmers.

#### 7) **Greening India**

This programme ensures plantation of various trees to increase the green covers on the land. Apart from mitigating the effects of climate change. These trees also help to augment the families income.

#### 8) **Organic Bazar**

This programme was started from the month of October, 2003 and first phase came to an end on 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2010. Now extended here the farmers take their produce to the city consumers. Currently such markets are being organised at 8 places on every Wednesday & Saturday.

#### 9) **Organic/Bio-Village**

Deepmedia is a village at the end of Baduria Block. This village is surrounded by river Icchamati by 3 sides. So that chances of pollution through contamination is minimum. Now 95 nos. of farmers are practicing Organic Farming at Deepmedia on approximately 31 hectors of land. These farmers are also selling their excess production in Harishpur Organic Bazar on every Sunday.

#### 10) **Organic Jute**

This is the 3<sup>rd</sup> year of this programme. Jute happens to be a major crop for the farmers of West Bengal. Gunnies and other packing material made out of natural jute fibre started loosing market in the face of synthetic alternatives. These had resulted in the decrease in demand of natural fibre. All the concerned people were looking for avenues to obtain some value added items which could have wider acceptance from the consumer. Jute fibre produced organically i.e. not using any chemical fertilisers or poisonous insecticides commands a better price in the international market.

Central Research Institute for Jute & Allied Fibres (CRIJAF) has been very very helpful in formulating various strategies to alleviate the condition of jute farmers in West Bengal. CRIJAF had put us in touch with Ganges Jute Pvt. Ltd who acted as our private industry partner in carrying out organic jute initiative.

This year 471 nos. of farmers cultivated organic jute on 715 bighas of land.

We, add Vikas Kendra is very very positive & confident of changing the agricultural situation in West Bengal through organic jute cultivation.

#### 11) **National Horticulture Mission**

Horticulture Mission has an office in the Block. This office has an opportunity to implement different work schedule like Organic Agriculture, Gardening & Producing Organic Fertiliser. Vikas Kendra act as a facilitator between Farmers and NHM.

After submitting application form to maintain rules & regulation of NHM for producing flowers and vermicompost, 85 numbers of Horticulturist and 2 numbers of Organic farmers have got the money for producing flowers and vermicompost. Another 25 farmers have got 1Pin Kits.

#### 12) **Internal Control System (ICS)**

Vikas Kendra has got the ICS project of Ministry of Agriculture Cooperation, Department of National Programme for Organic products Govt. of India through the Agriculture Department Govt. of West

Bengal. Under this project 1500 farmers are being trained on organic farming of 15 villages under Baduria and Swarupnagar Blocks. These farmers are using organic fertilisers for producing in their 654 hectors of own land. An application has been made to certification agency APOF, Bangalore for certification of 654 hectors of land. We have also got another two Bio Gas Slurry Project through West Bengal Government. Where nine farmers of two villages have cultivated rice on 2 acres of land through Bio Gas Slurry and they have got sufficient crop.

### 13) **Exhibition:**

Every year in the month of November SEVA organise a Fair known as “Titumeer Mela” at our village Atghara. Exhibition of Organic Agricultural Products had a special attraction in that Fair. On 21<sup>st</sup> November in this year Travelling Van of Soil Testing Lab had a special attraction for Farmers Day. Seven numbers of Soil Test Examiner of Govt. of West Bengal from Tollygunge had tested the soil of 120 numbers of Organic Farmers continuously three days. After investigation they have immediately handed over the satisfactory report to the farmers. Also 177 numbers of organic farmers had participated in this Farmers Day programme. Deputy Joint Director of Agriculture Dept. Govt. of West Bengal Sri Bhakti Kusum Das, Dr. Sanjoy Bhattacharya and other Agriculture Specialist had deliberated their speech.

This year like as other years an Agricultural Stall had been open at the “Bharat Mela” at Baduria. Everyday foods produced from Solar Cooker had been served to the visitors. Agriculture Dept. of Vikas Kendra had exhibited the items of Organic Vegetables, Food Processing & Solar Cooker in the Fair of Lok Festival at Banipur, Habra. Also 47 numbers of Organic Farmers had exhibited 12 numbers of items of Organic Vegetables in the exhibition of organic produce at the Bhandar Kona, Nadia.

### **Organic Fodder Cultivation**

India is an agricultural country. At present in India 61% population depends upon agriculture. Agriculture and Animal Husbandry are depending upon one of another. Importance of Animal Husbandry is very essential for continuous growth of agriculture. In modern agriculture application of Animal Husbandry is very low. Importance of Animal Husbandry is necessary in rural economy. Fodder cultivation is necessary for maintaining sound health of the cattle. Again the fodder cultivation will improve the fertility by reducing the use of chemical fertilisers and also will check some disease and pests of the new crop. Application of cow dung manure in the crop field not only increases the soil fertility but also improves physical properties and water holding capacity of soil. Fodder cultivation has great impact on the production of organic crops where cattle manure is an essential part. This year we had collected four types fodder seeds from Regional Station for Forage Production & Demonstration, Klayani, Nadia and distributed them to 14 farmers of 5 villages including Dwipmedia. Also fodder seeds had distributed amongst 15 nos of SHG women of 4 villages of the organisation of Lokohito. Everybody had cultivated in their land and production of milk has increased.

### **Acitivities of Rural Empowerment**

From different training, workshops and meetings it was heard that most of the farmers don't know the proper methods of utilisation of deferent organic waste. Agricultural Dept.of Vikas Kendra trained & demonstrated to the farmers the preparation and use of vermicompost, phospho compost, liquid manure, botanical pesticides and fungicides etc. Demonstration has given to SHG women and farmers of Dwipmedia organic village. Mud pots had been distributed amongst 15 SHG women to keep liquid manure. A suggestion had been given to prepare compost manure in the field to reduce time and carrying cost. Some farmers had produced compost manure and after using in their field excess manure had sold in the organic market.

### **Technology Transfer**

Vikas Kendra developed some indigenous technology for the preparation of liquid manure for application on the crops, botanical pesticides and fungicides for the control of pest and diseases. Those are eco-friendly and less expensive. Efficient staff of Organic Agriculture Dept., of Vikas Kendra had demonstrated to 6 workers of 4 districts under the programme conducted by CRS.

“Lokohito is an NGO at Machlandapur arranged an exposure visit to Vikas Kendra and Organic Agriculture Farm with 95 nos. of SHG members divided into 3 groups. So that they can cultivate their land by their own experience. To increase the knowledge of Organic Farming of the Students of BCKV, IGNOU an exposure visit programme had been introduced in the field of Organic Farms at Prafulla Nagar, Vikas Kendra led by Prof. Mahadev Pramanik, Training Coordinator, IGNOU. In this year two staff had been taken training Certificate in Organic Farming from BCKV, IGNOU Course to be more efficient in Organic Farming.

### **Paddy-cum-Fish Cultivation**

In the low land, farmers cultivated Aman paddy varieties in traditional way. At present high yielding Aman paddy is being cultivated replacing the local Aman Paddy. The high yielding paddy needs plant protection chemicals as a result all the fishes in the paddy field are destroyed along with other beneficial insects. But at present situation, high yielding varieties of paddy have lost their potential yield, as a result, the cost involved for the production of fertiliser, pesticides, fungicides and labour is not at all profitable than the local Amon Paddy varieties at one side of the one bigha area a small ditch was made and the border was surrounded by medium height bund. Some extra profit can be earned to cultivate Fish and Duck. If some insects dropped into the water, fish and duck can eat that insects. Food of fish can be easily available from the stool of duck. So no separate food is needed for the fish. Income can be increased to plant the social forestry trees in the surrounding bund.

Five families of Dwipmedia village had earned extra profit by the cultivation of paddy with fish and vegetable in surrounding bund. Farmers had got donation of Rs.750/- from Coconut Development Board to plant the coconut trees in the surround bund.

### **Agriculture Extension Centre (AEC)**

Different crops had been cultivated in the seven bighas of land of (AEC) of Vikas Kendra by the care of two farmers. In the season of Aman & Rabi, paddy, oilseed & vegetables had been cultivated in the vacant place between the mango trees. The farmers of Vikas Kendra had cultivated their land on the basis of organic agriculture formula and used the organic fertilisers in their land after preparing of it. They had used Neem oil for the control of pest and diseases.

At present from different places SHGs & Farmers had visited that organic farms as exposure visit and got experience of organic farming and inspired.

### **Campus Development:**

In the campus of Vikas Kendra has various fruit crops, areca nuts, black peppers, timber plants, medicinal plants. Also every year seedlings of coconut and medicinal plants have been raised in the nursery for sale in the organic market and local areas. SEVA earns some money from the sale of these items. On the basis of prescription of Ayurveda practitioners some patients are the regular buyers of those medicinal plants of Vikas Kendra.

## **HEALTH**

We would report the activities in two major parts, curative and preventive.

#### **A. Curative:**

We have some regular clinics which provide curative service to the patients reporting for treatment. The statistics are:-

### **First Aid Service:**

A total No. of 145 cases were handled 95 Male and 50 Female. Out of this 64 were given tetanus toxoid injection.

## **B. Preventive Activities**

### **Immunisation:**

38 nos. of camps were organised at Vikas Kendra and local villages. 2259 nos. of children were immunized.

### **Pulse Polio:**

camps were organised at Atghara village and at 8 hamlets. No. of children vaccinated were 316. We have done three visits to cover 596 families & for number dropout children.

### **Special Campaign for Sanitation & Safe Drinking Water**

We have organised awareness programme for sanitation and safe drinking water through CCD Project in 24 hamlets under 19 villages, 10 Panchayats and 4 blocks.

- Sanitation :**
- Personal cleanliness
  - Soap must be used in toilet
  - Slipper must be used in latrine
  - Enough water should be used in latrine
  - In every home use latrine is mandatory
  - A fixed place should be used for urine.

- Safe Drinking Water**
- Filter should be used for drinking water
  - Surrounding portion of Tube well at below level should be made by concrete.
  - Drinking water should be used after investigation.
  - Drain should be kept at least 20 feet distance from Tube well.
  - Surrounding portion of Tube well at below should be kept always clean.

### **School Health Programme**

Child Health topics had been discussed including Sanitation, Immunization, Nutrition, Family Health Education, Hygiene, Tuberculosis (T.B.) and also their behavioural changes during adolescent period. Total nos. of 436 guardians attended the meetings on sixteen different dates.

### **School Health for Adolescent Programme:**

Three meetings were held in Atghara High School, Jangalpur High School & Atghara Jakir Hossain High School. We could speak to 48 boys and 82 girls from class ix and x. The topics were touched to Family Life Education, Harmful Effects of Early Marriage Child Right General Issues and Equality, Arsenic contamination, Personal Hygiene, Aids, STD and different Physical and Mental changes etc.

### **Dental Check-up Camp for Primary Schools**

We have organised 16 dental check-up camps for the student of different standards in 16 different schools in 19 different villages. A total number of 216 boys and 235 girls were attended by Dr. Monisankar Ghosh & Dr. Jakir Hossain. Another part of Health Department did the non-medico check-up & counseling to the guardians of the students.

On 5<sup>th</sup> Jan. at 10am an eye check-up cam was conducted at Jasaikati Jakir Hossain High School Dr.S.Saha treated 41 primary students and related counseling has been done by the respective doctor & health staff.

### **General Health Check-up Camps for Primary School Students**

We have done 5 General Health Check-up camps for the Primary School Students in the camps. We have covered total 315 students, among them boys were 172 and girls 143.

### **General awareness amongst villagers on general health aspects services from Govt. facilities**

### **Mental Health Awareness Programme**

We have organised two mental health awareness programme at VK dated 26<sup>th</sup> Nov. & 10<sup>th</sup> Dec.'09 by Dr. Suranjana Ganguly, Psychiatrist 25 & 18 attended from patients family members, Panchayat Members and interested villagers.

### **Awareness camps for anti T.B. Campaign**

20 camps were organised in 19 villages and 12 Gram Panchayats to make people aware of the killing affects of T.B. A total no. of 517 attended the camps including 453 women. We have received assistance from Baduria Primary Health Centre, School Teacher, Members ICAS, Health Workers (ANM) health authority, DoTs authority SHG TB patients & Block Medical Officer of Health etc. We have received support from German Leprosy Mission led by Dr. Atindra Pathak. Under this programme we have conducted 14 TB awareness camps & 404 were present including 291 women.

### **Awareness Camps for Medicinal Plants**

We have arranged 4 programmes at Simulpur Farmania by Dr. Dulal Paul, Medicinal Expert. Total 108 villagers were attended including S.H.G. members. Dr. Paul had discussed for a long time about the utility of the easily available plants & its proper use in daily life. Some of the women have already planted aloe & gulancha.

### **Training on Smokeless Chulha**

Smokeless Chulha Training Programme was arranged at Makaltala, Farmania, Harispur, Jasaikathi, Choudhuripara. We organised 4 Nos. of training with Self Hop Group. A total no. of participants – 81 S.H.G. women attended practical demonstration & discussion. Total 37 chulha have already been installed.

### **Management of Malnourished Child**

We have been able to identify 92 children as severely malnourished of 17 villages. They are kept under close observation. We could arrange ten special health check-up camps under the supervision by Dr. Muktipada Basak. Ten special camps were organised at 7 places (Farmania, Vikas Kendra, Sayedpur, Panji, Harispur, Jasaikathi, Simulpur), out of 92 malnourished children 20 became, nearly normal. 31 children have improved in remarkable position. Apart from close parents counseling between Family visit including height, weight check-up and growth monitoring card maintained and also provided medicines.

### **Awareness Programmes on Food Demonstration**

We organised 7 nos. of Food demonstration programmes with practical food demonstration. Emphasis on three kinds of colour food, drinking adequate water & discussed how to eat all the related foods maintaining its proper nutritive values.

661 Participants came from several villages in these food demonstration programmes.

**Development Goal:**

*To contribute to the overall development of children up to 18 years of marginalized and backward sections of society in North-24-Parganas District in line with Millennium Development Goal 2 (achieve universal primary education), MDG 4 (reduce child mortality) and MDG 3 (improve maternal health) besides MDG 1 (eradicate extreme poverty & hunger) and MDG 7 (ensure environmental sustainability)*

**About Vikas Kendra**

A group of interested young men & women, encouraged by the Institute of Social Work (ISW), formed a local club and started to implement some of the pro people activities at the village Atghara. The group was known as Atghara Gramin Unnayan Samsad. In the year 1982 we had the *opportunity to meet* Ms. Elisabeth Kreuz of Indienhilfe e.V. Germany at our village Atghara & with IH's encouraging donation we could start a charitable homeopathy dispensary on 13<sup>th</sup> November 1983. Another turning point came when we had the chance to meet with Sh. Asok Ghosh, the then president of ISW; in the year 1984 & we mutually agreed to start the project Vikas Kendra on 1<sup>st</sup> April, 1985.

The joint work started from 1985 under the name of Vikas Kendra under the umbrella of ISW. In 1986 SEVA got registered and continued as project holder of Vikas Kendra until today. VK was supported by Indienhilfe e.V, Herrsching, Germany from the year 1985 till today.

In the beginning we started our activities with Agriculture, Health & Education. After that as per the felt need of the locality we began Animal Husbandry activity. We have facilitated to form or revive the local youth groups to take an initiative for their own village development. It was really a functional means of development for the stakeholders. We were emphasizing from the very beginning about the positive role of Panchayets & other concerned Govt. offices and considered them as influential stakeholders. From the very beginning we have introduced Organic Agriculture practices. Bidhan Chandra Krishi Vidyalaya has extended their hearty cooperation since 1986 from the very beginning.

Vikas Kendra has built a very rational and functional relation with the Govt. Health Deptt. And setting all required medicines for immunisation. We were proud to accept the family planning methods even amongst the women of minority community. Propagation of blood donation is one of our success stories.

We ran a few numbers of non formal centres in the needy hamlets of Atghara. With the support of Eye Care & Research centre, Kolkata we have checked the non formal students and unfortunately found that 25% of the students are suffering from night blindness. It also triggered us to introduce health activities in an

intense way.

We took an initiative with the support of Ramakrishna Mission, Narendrapur to organise many trainings on Smokeless Chullah and installed more than 10000 Smokeless Chullahs in the year 1985 in Atghara and neighbouring villages to protect the women and for their better health.

We formed a very effective groups and assembled into a rally with more than 1000 in the year 1985 at Atghara.

We found that people have their hunger for culture but there were no facilities in this area. So, we tried our best to organise cultural programme and also tried to find out the dormant talents of the local children through introducing the well-known Titumeer Fair since our inception. We got a support from the Govt. and constructed more than 200 toilets of the sanitation campaign in the year 1988-89.

This is also our day to day experiences that the farmers are exploited by the middle men. So to prevent part of that system and stop distress sale from the local farmers we have taken another initiative to construct a Grain Storage (Dharmogola) where the real farmers will sell their product and enjoy many facilities which are not available in the formal market. Even after that when we sell the stored product the same farmers will get 50% of profit in cash.

As part of our commitment to society we have started Ananda Kendra in the year 1993, foundation was laid down by the eminent freedom fighter Sh. Pannalal Dasgupta. In the year 1995 we have inaugurated the same by another National Social Worker late Ms. Phulurenu Guha. We had the opportunity to get blessing from Mother Teresa.

#### Preface:

It was the suggestion from Indienhilfe e.V. that supports us since 1985 to go for a holistic approach for development for economically or socially marginal population as identified in project villages. Project team of Vikas Kendra along with the community (panchayat members too) tried to find out few areas where people are living in difficult situation and lacking necessary infrastructure or services for health, education and livelihood options. There are existing government infrastructure like ICDS centres, SSKs, Primary schools, Secondary schools, subcentres, Primary Health Centres, Block Primary Health Centres which are working with block and district administration as state representatives who are working as per their agenda but still the underprivileged are not able to access all the facilities or facilities are not enough to provide a basic living standard to 100% population. Vikas Kendra being a non government agency can play crucial role in judging and validating the rate of success claimed by Government. With PRIs and local youth clubs and direct focus group, project team of Vikas Kendra would try to identify pockets of severe problems and try to provide support services like tuition centres for first generation learners, health services to access Govt. centres and proper follow up, critical diseases etc. agricultural to secure food and safe food and empowerment on citizen rights so that a greater impact could be seen tangibly.

#### Problem analysis:

The nature of the youth groups changed. In some cases the newer groups were not so keen as their predecessors. Due to recent global situation livelihood is becoming a challenge for all of us. So that youth group leaders are not taking interest to be involved in so called rural development work.

#### Need Assessment:

In sociology there are two kinds of need. First one is felt need which is demanded by the stakeholders. And the second one is perceived need which is introduced by the external people for the stakeholders. Another important thing is whether money oriented development or development oriented money. So, for any kind of initiative for the village always we have to do the need assessment first. Then only we can find out the source and start to work. The activity plan should be always as per the need of the poor. Only the required gap we have to fill up.

#### Concept of participatory integrated development

Gandhiji taught us that if you like to solve any issue of the masses; you should take the issue to the masses. This is the ideal lesson for the community development through community participation. From the

very beginning the youth clubs were the main focus as means of development for the villages and obviously it was remarkable community participation. Community development can't succeed without community participation.

So, Community should be involved right from the planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation stage. The 3-tier Panchayat Raj System becomes stronger and more effective as one of the important sides of development. We are planning to form four Clusters accordingly to in four geographical areas and will try to ensure the full participation from the Youth Groups, I.C.D.S, High & Primary schools, SSK, MSK, Health centre, Gram Panchayets & all other developmental organisations to ensure the sustainable development. Holistic Health, Education, Agriculture & Allied matters will be our main focus for the Community Development through community based approach. The outcome of the total efforts will be thought for empowering the rural working class for their own thinking & development. Always we have a plan to phase out and also phase in and more & more deserving villages.

### WOMEN'S HELPLINE

In the male dominated society prevailing in India safety of women are always unpredicted in rural areas. The Ministry of Social Welfare, Govt. of India has introduced Helpline or Help phone on a 24 hour basis to assist the helpless and endangered women.

With the rapid change of family pattern due to disintegration of joint family structure social changes like maladjustment, urbanisation and increasing obsession with materials gain etc are increasing day by day. The absence of support against this situation, the women & girls are facing emotional problems like loneliness, depression, interpersonal conflict, suicide feelings and so on. To face the situation of distress now women need alternative system of support like shelter, rehabilitation help or legal help etc.

This problem has been solved to a great extent with increased usage of mobile phone.

This is the first time, this 24 hours help phone has been introduced in 'Kolkata' & its surrounding areas. If women are in danger on the road this phone may be of great help to them. The people of voluntary organisation will come forward to help the endangered & helpless women if the scheduled numbers are dialled. The arrangement for taking legal action by law & the police will also be available in this regard & all the expenditure is borne by the Human Resource Development Department of the Govt. of India. The Help Line numbers of the voluntary organisation are 10921, 10922, 10923, 10924, 10925 & 10926. The Help Line number of Kolkata Police is 1091.

Women Help Line services started at Vikas Kendra from April 2004, with the toll free number of 10926.

The Department of Human Resource Development has directed to handle cautiously, each case in the village area & they are also under the women Help Line scheme. The following issues are under the case of the Department of HRD of Govt. of India.

- Any disturbance on road during travelling.
- Victim of Deprivation.
- Emotional problem.
- Social oppression.
- Accidental cause in family.
- Driven away from family relatives.
- Forceful Divorce.
- Inability in returning to family after being released from imprisonment.
- Become homeless due to natural calamity.
- Forced to be engaged in sexual activities illegally.
- Sexually tortured or abuse.

- Without getting any help from family & victim of tension.
- Mentally handicapped / retarded.

### **Help Line Work Methodology**

- Help Line team believes that every person in need who contacts them is important. A woman may call the centre just to ventilate or for any kind of immediate help. Thus each call needs to be attended with due care.
- Help Line is a participatory intervention process of finding solution to individual problems & solutions must not be imposed upon the clients.
- Help Line is a strategy to network with other organisations in order to provide required help to the needy.
- Follow-up is done by making regular calls to referral organisation to review the case & by involving allied organisations for keeping personal contact.
- Regular contact is maintained with telephone department to ensure that the telephone lines are in order.
- Regular meetings are organised with resource organisations for updating the date bank for referral services.
- Documentation on the experience of the Help Line.

It is to be ensured that appropriate level of confidentiality is maintained in each case.

The women Help Line was established in April 2004. The Toll Free Phone Number in Habra Telephone Exchange is 10926 & other is (not toll free) 03216-220635.

This Women Help Line at present is consisting of two members & their service is available for round the clock. The name of two Help Line Counsellors are Ms.Tuhina Sarkar (Roy) (M.S.W.) & Ms.Shabari Sanyal (M.S.W.).

During the year 2009-2010 we have got 81 cases from women for help out of those, we have been able to close / make reconciliation in 37 cases until now & other 44 cases are referred to the other possible places. Amongst 81 cases, 46 cases are maladjustment with husband & In-laws, 5 cases women need for shelter for their children's. 4 cases women wanted children to adopt 9 cases are about wanting legal assistance about their cases. 4 cases women need psychotherapist for their children, 1 case quarrel with neighbour's & 1 case maladjustment between daughter & mother about affair of her daughter. During the year we have conducted 22 Awareness Development Programmes at different villages.

We have conducted awareness development programme for the school students with the help of National University of Juridical Sciences (NUJS) of Govt. of India on 25<sup>th</sup> July'09 at Raj Ballavpur High School, Maslandapur, under Baduria Block, North 24 Parganas District with 200 students.

We also visited many police station for follow-up of various cases as per details below.

- On 21<sup>st</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> May'09 we met with the Officer-in-Charge of Baduria Police Station North 24 Parganas for seeking cooperation for the case related Women's Help Line.
- On 26<sup>th</sup> Jan.'09 to follow-up the same case.
- On 20<sup>th</sup> July'09 we met with the Officer-in-Charge of Deganga Police Station, on 30<sup>th</sup> Oct.'09, 29<sup>th</sup>

Nov.'09 Officer-in-Charge of Baduria Police Station.

We have also visited Bagjola Gram.Panchayat. Jadurhati Uttar Gram.Panchayat, Jasaikati Atghara Gram Panchayat, Baduria B.D.O. Office, Jadurhati Dakshin Gram Panchayat, Deganga B.D.O. Office on 20<sup>th</sup> July'09, for orientation about Women Help Line.

We have also conducted the two programmes on legal counselling with the help of the National University of Juridical Sciences.

## EDUCATION

### Why we run Tuition Centres:

Education Section provide educational support to the selected children of 6-14 years in project villages through tuition centre by maintaining selection criteria of first generation learner, BPL family child, poor living condition & low family income. The tuition centers have a major role on eradication of child Labour from our society. Through our tuition support we are able to increase quality education. There is a system in primary school, that is "No Detention System". In the poorest & illiterate family children do not get any educational support from family, so students are mostly irregular. Through tuition centers we try to minimize the irregularity in school attendance, increase quality education and finally prevent Child Labour.

### We Run Tuition Centres:

We could run 21 tuition centres (18 tuition centres, 2 women adult education & one slow learner's tuition centre) by the respective tuition teachers. Tuition classes run on 6 days per week for 3 hours.

After assessment in the middle of the year, 20 tuition centres are running in 17 villages by 10 village animator cum tuition teachers.

Centre is running as per schedule,

### Preparatory Tests:

Concerned teachers have completed two preparatory tests for 21 tuition centres, in half yearly basis. At the 1st half yearly test total 505 students have attended & 452 passed up to the marks.

At the 2<sup>nd</sup> half yearly tests ,total 486 students have attended the test & the following grades are given, Grade A -58 students, Grade B-136 students, Grade C-118 students, Grade D-107 students, Grade E-63 students & Grade F- 04 students.

### **Guardian Meeting:**

We have conducted total 45 nos. of guardians meetings at our tuition centres by the respected tuition teachers. Total 945 guardians attended the meetings. Subject was need of tuition centres, role of tuition centres, role of guardians, need of education, school education system, child labour issues, midday meal, "Right to Free and Compulsory Education Act-2009" etc.

### **Students Family Visit:**

403 families have been visited by education staffs, 64 students get readmission & 177 irregular students became regular in school by the initiative of all the tuition teachers, education staffs, within this reporting period. General awareness programme was arranged in 19 times in 16 villages, in our working area on education in every target villages,

### **Village awareness programme:**

The respective village staffs have taken initiative to make better relation with the villagers and keeping close liaison with the unschooled & dropout children families for readmission in school & campaigning against child labour. So we get good result against un-schooling, dropout & combat child labour.

### **Strengthening local institution (SLI):**

We attended 19no.of VEC/ MTA meeting of Primary Schools at our area in this year. We have appealed to the present members to ensure full enrolment of the drop out children, mid day meal & building construction etc.

We have met with 59 headmaster, 3 SI(school inspector) & 7 GP Prodhans in our area, to discuss with them about dropout & unschooled children, child labour issues, readmission in school & midday meal in the schools of our concerned areas.

We also distributed display boards in 64 schools in our working area, to propagate child rights issues & to prevent child labour.

### **Nature Education:**

We have conducted 18no.of nature study class on forth-nightly basis in 20 tuition centres. This is mainly outreach programme for the students on nature study in a practical way by the respective teachers. Students also learned how to make survey, how to make list of waste materials, the usefulness of trees, leaves of different trees by field work & practical session.

### **Value Education:**

We have conducted 20no.of value added education sessions in fort-nightly basis in 20 tuition centres. The teachers discussed with the students of an eminent persons about their life & their activities like Sahid Nisar Ali Titumeer, Jaharlal Nehru, Sahid Khudiram, locally nobleman, Hassan & Hossain etc.

### **Library:**

We have a library named 'Sheed Titumeer Public Library'. The Library is open for five days in a week

i.e. Sunday, Tuesday, Thursday, Wednesday & Saturday. Many kinds of books are in our library. There is story books, novels, essays, poems, dramas, religious book also. We have so many papers & magazines. All are welcome for library membership. We take token fees.

### **Work with other network:**

Vikas Kendra is associated with different network like West Bengal education network(WBEN), Right to food & work network, Indian Hilfe network against child labour(IHNACL), Environment Nature Research Education(ENRE) etc.

We have attended two workshop & five meetings of WBEN. Our deputed persons attended three days three workshop of ENRE. Eight meetings were attended by our staff of IHNACL. Three meetings attended of right to food and work network.

With this, we are doing work with IHNACL to make Jasaikati Atghara, GP child labour free. Mr. S. Ramesh resource person from MVF, ( Andhra Pradesh) is staying at VK and helping our child labour work. Eight volunteer working in our panchayat being divided in to sixteen unites. Total 256 child labour were identified in the GP area.

### **Food Processing Unit**

Food Processing Unit is running successfully by the initiative of Vikas Kendra. Different kinds of foods produced through Food Processing Unit in the financial year 2009-10 like Jam, Jelly, Mango Pickle, Mustered Mango, Squash, Tomato Sauce and honey. These food products have been sold in the market in the brand name of Tripti. In the financial year 2009-10 the total cost of production including wages is Rs.26,067/- and total sales proceeds of Rs.41,928/- and at the end of the year closing balance is Rs15,803/-. Economically weaker girl of Ananda Kendra financially got some help after done some work through this Unit and day by day they are getting efficiency.

## **CHILD CARE & NUTRITION**

We had 14 SVKS, in this year we have organised an assessment & we start our SVK as a new form that is Child Development Centre (C.D.C) in 9 villages, there have 9 C.D.C. Where I.C.D.S. was near by our SVK, we stop our centre & said villagers to send their children at I.C.D.S centre & take Govt. facilities like Pre-primary education & also nutrition. We had focused on the child Pre-primary Education & Nutrition. Particularly between the age of 0 – 6 years. We worked very closely with 19 villages, there are 9 Gram Panchayat.

### **Home Visit:**

We focused on Home Visit – specially to ensure regular schooling, to check Nutritional Status, Immunisation Status, Cleanliness, Hygiene etc. Home visit have been done by our CDW, CG, Field Assistant, and Assistant Coordinator also.

### **C.D.C. Visit:**

All the original & important documents relating to our Institution are kept here.

Day-to-to Accounting work, Finalisation of Accounts, & Bank operational work of the Institution are done from here.

Maximum Working Committee Meeting of the Institution are held at City Office & their proceedings are prepared and kept here.

As a matter of fact, though it is termed as City Office, it functions in effect as the Head Office.

### **MANAB JAMIN**

Manab Jamin have stepped in to 11 years of its services on Sustainable Agriculture, Education, Environment, Health, Animal Husbandry, Self Help Group, etc. at 15 villages under 4 Gram Panchayet of



Bolpur – Sriniketan Block. The focus of the programme was improvement of Agriculture based on income through sustainable agriculture. The target population is ST, SC and economically weaker sections of the community.

The weather was very unpredictable during this year. There was no rain still 2<sup>nd</sup> week of July. So Manab Jamin had faced many problems to implement the agriculture based programme.

## **Agriculture**

### **Green Manure in Aman paddy**

One training programme was organised to carry forward the usage of Green Manure in Aman Paddy cultivation. Seven farmers took up the task in 6 bighas of land. 24 Kgs. of Dhaincha seeds were distributed amongst them. The Dhaincha plants took more time to decompose, due to non-availability of rain.

### **Application of Bio fertilizer in Aman Paddy.**

Last few years Manab Jamin had supplied bio-fertilizer for Aman paddy cultivation during summer. During this year Manab Jamin had organized 8 numbers of training on Application of Bio fertilizer where 124 numbers of farmers participated. 55 nos. of farmers have demonstrated in 67 bighas of land for Aman paddy cultivation.

### **Commercial Vegetable Cultivation organically by SHG women**

This is one of the Income Generation Programmes for the SHG Women. The SHG women had been trained on vegetable cultivation organically. The women sold their product at local market. During this year Manab Jamin had organized 5 nos. of trainings on vegetable cultivation organically by SHG women where 101 members of different SHG participated. At the same time 12 women of Manab Jamin Project Area have implemented this programme 2 times in a year.

### **Introduction of Crop Rotation**

Manab Jamin Project Area is rain fed, mono-crop area where paddy is the only crop. Manab Jamin had tried to cultivate wheat, mustard, lentil etc. with the residual moisture after harvesting of Aman Paddy as a crop rotation programme. During this year, 11 farmers have participated in Wheat demonstration programme, 135 farmers in Mustard demonstration programme and 44 farmers in lentil demonstration programme. After follow up of the demonstration programme, it was found that most of the farmers used water of pond, river or canal for irrigation and cow dung, mustard oil cake, poultry litter, Bio-gas slurry etc had been used as manure. The average yield of mustard is 1125 kg per ha and wheat is 1500 kg per ha. average yield of lentil is 525 kg per ha.

### **Various Demonstration Programme**

### 1) **Black Gram**

During this year 45 farmers have participated in black gram demonstration program. 3.09 hectare of land had been covered.

### 2) **Turmeric**

Turmeric demonstration programme was undertaken during this year to encourage the village women. 100 kg of turmeric seeds had been distributed among 65 farmers of 5 villages and covered 2.1 ha of land.

### 3) **Mushroom**

During this year, 8 trainings on Mushroom cultivation had been conducted, where 77 villagers had participated. 222 nos. of SHG Women and landless farmers had adopted this programme, where 180 nos. got good yield. 43 farmers had sold extra quantity at the market after consumption at home. An unemployed youth have earned Rs. 5000 through out the season from Mushroom cultivation.

### **Vermicompost**

To increase the supply of organic input, Manab Jamin had initiated promotion of vermicompost. During this year 4 numbers of training have been organized where 61 women participated. 12 numbers of demonstrations had been done. 12 farmers have propagated vermicompost pit and used it for their own kitchen garden; vegetable cultivation, etc. some of them sold extra quantity in the market.

### **Relay Cropping**

Manab Jamin works in a rain-fed mono crop area. The people of this area practice paddy cultivation only. After inception, Manab Jamin tried to introduce second crop cultivation within the residual moisture before harvesting of Amon paddy. The second crop continues to grow utilizing the residual moisture and nutrients. Three numbers of training had been organized where 62 farmers participated. Eleven farmers of four villages had demonstrated on relay cropping which covered 0.65 hectare of land.

### **Mixed Cropping**

This is an attempt to grow two crops in place of one. A short duration of Amon paddy is followed by a mixed crop of pulses and oil seed grown with the residual moisture after harvesting of short duration Amon paddy. This increases the crop intensity by 100%.

This year 37 farmers of 2 villages undertook the training programme on mixed cropping.. After harvesting of Amon paddy, 12 farmers of 2 villages grew mixed cropping of Lentil and Tury Mustard utilizing the residual moisture and covered 1 ha of land.

### **Liquid Manure and Liquid Organic Pesticides**

Liquid organic manure and liquid organic pesticides are the unique varieties of fertilizers and pesticides which are used for vegetable production. Village women have used these for kitchen garden and commercial vegetable cultivation organically. The women got maximum return from the kitchen garden by the use of liquid manure and liquid organic pesticides.

We organized 7 nos. of training cum demonstration programme on preparation of liquid organic manure and liquid organic pesticides in 7 villages where 150 women have participated in this programme. They used leafs and plant of leguminous plants with cow urine and cow dung with soil. For liquid pesticide they use different types of leaves, fruits (neem, nisinda, segun leaves, caster apple leaves, wood apple leaves, neem seed kernel etc.).

### **Grow your seed yourself**

Use of traditional variety seeds in agriculture is one of the component for organic farming and sustainable agricultural practices, but due to introduction of High Yielding Variety Seeds farmers are dependent on marketed seeds and lose their traditional variety seeds. Manab Jamin had organized the training programme for the farmers for last three years on “grow your seed yourself”. During this year ten numbers of training have been organized in ten villages, where 226 farmers have participated.

### **Backyard Orchard**

This is one of the popular and environment protection programmes under Manab Jamin. Every year Manab Jamin distributed fruit trees among the villagers. The objective of this programme is to provide additional nutrition with their regular food consumption at the same time to increase plant population and protect soil erosion. During this year, 1834 nos. of fruit trees had been distributed by Manab Jamin among 375 nos. of villagers under Mamab Jamin project area.

### **Social Forestry**

The main idea of the programme is to extend the green area and to create awareness among the villagers on plantation of trees and increase the plant population as well as protection of soil erosion. This is also part of the combat climate change programme. During this year 12000 social forestry seedlings had been raised. 21 farmers of 7 villages have received 4954 social forestry seedlings that covered 3.3 hectare of land. At the end of the year, it is found that the survival rate is 98.02%.

### **Kitchen Garden**

The idea of this programme is to propagate homestead kitchen garden, which would be the source of nutritional supply for the family as well as secondary source of earning. We have supplied seeds and seedlings 3 times in a year like in Kharif, Rabi and Pre Kharif season. The women have used liquid organic manure and liquid organic pesticides, vermi compost partly in kitchen garden. During this year, 346 nos. of women have demonstrated the kitchen garden programme. The productions of vegetables have enriched their diet. Few women have earned some money by selling a part of the production at the MJ sponsored Bio Bazaar.

### **Medicinal Plants**

There is a medicinal garden at Manab Jamin Campus at Mirzapur. (From this Garden villagers get medicinal plant for their health garden) *The detail of which is given below.*

### **Training on Medicinal Plants**

During this year 9 nos. of training had been organized on use of medicinal plants in 9 villages where 149 nos. of women have participated. Through participation of this programme the women have acquired some knowledge on use of locally available medicinal plants for prevention of primary illness. After this training the use of medicinal plants have increased among the villagers.

### **Promotion of Medicinal Garden (Health Garden)**

This programme has been designed to encourage health garden among the villagers within the homestead area. Women should take the responsibility to look after the medicinal garden. The women have got the technical knowledge on use of medicinal plants for prevention of primary illness. During this year 7 types of medicinal plants had been distributed among 99 women under Manab Jamin project area. The women have used medicinal plants for prevention of primary illness like acidity, stomach problem, cough & cold etc. it is also found that it also reduce the expenses of Allopathic medicine and its side effect. Villagers have saved nearly Rs. 25 to Rs. 100 per family.

### **Self Help Group**

All development agencies put the importance on SHG. This concept is much well known. Manab Jamin had started this programme from 2003. At present total number of SHG under Manab Jamin is 71. among them 56 groups are for women and rest of 15 are for men. 814 villagers have been involved in these different SHG groups. The majority of the members belong to Scheduled Caste community and the number is 375.

This year three SHG groups participated in Fair Trade Fair held from 22<sup>nd</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> October 2009 in Ice Skating Rink, Kolkata organized by Fair Trade Forum – India. The group has earned nearly Rs. 50,000.

### **Organic Bazaar**

This programme is supported by the Institute for Integrated Rural Development (IIRD), Aurangabad, Maharashtra. This bazaar programme is being run by Manab Jamin for the last 5 years. In this programme, vegetables produced by the organic farmers, directly sold to the consumer and there have neither any interference by any middle man. The producers get a premium price to sell vegetables at Bolpur and Santiniketan market which comes out to be around 20% over the price prevailing in their local markets. On the other hand the consumer gets fresh and organically produced vegetables at their local market price rate. At present the Organic Bazaar is held once in a week and average quantity of vegetables sold per month is 987.56 kg and average sales turnover per month is Rs.11225.50. The average number of producer involved in Bio Bazaar is 21 nos. and the average number of consumer per month is 52.

The producer also sells their product to Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra and Local Primary Schools.

### **Health Awareness Programme**

This programme is for the mothers and children in Manab Jamin Project Area. The idea of this programme is to create awareness among the women on health, hygiene and sanitation. There have been discussions on family planning, immunization, nutrition personal health & hygiene etc. A qualified doctor conducts this awareness programme. During this year 10 nos. of training had been organized at ten different villages for 277 women. The Health in charge conducted 6 nos. of meetings on safe food for expecting, lactating mother and children at six villages under Manab Jamin project area at the same time the In charge also conducted the health awareness meeting on under age pregnancy and family planning for better growth of each child. Twelve nos. of meetings have been organized where 183 nos. of women have participated. There have been discussions on to combat population explosion, immunization, child health care etc.

### **Water Purification**

Every year MJ members with the help of FGF Groups have took the initiative for water purification by lime and bleaching powder with the idea of prevention of water borne diseases during rainy season. A repeat application is done after rain. During this year 113 wells and 258 tube well water have been treated by bleaching powder and lime at thirteen villages with the help of Eco group members.

### **Jujube Up gradation**

Manab Jamin had upgraded 25 nos. of plants at 3 villages under MJ project area during this year. This is one of the programmes for poverty alleviation. Sour jujube plants are upgraded into sweet one by this programme.

### **Common Resources management**

Manab Jamin had worked on livelihood. Manab jamin had an idea on waste land development through plantation as well as common resources management 14 Acres of land had been planted at the sand bed area of Ajay river through plantation of orchards and social forestry seedlings under this programme. The non cultivable area is become utilized by different way. Two tier cropping system is practiced at the plantation area. Villagers get fuel, fodder, fruits and vegetables throughout the year from the same land.

### **Future Generation Farmers Group**

Ecological movement has been started under Manab Jamin since last six years. At present 10 Eco Groups are working actively at 10 villages. The idea of this programme is to promote Eco Group and to create awareness against environment pollution and to grow habit for tree plantation to protect the environment. The members of Eco Group are in the age group of 11 to 18 years and student from class VI to XII at local high school. The eco group members are coming from farmers and day labourers families.

During this year, MJ have emphasized to work on waste and its recycling, disaster management, climate change etc. Ten nos. of daylong workshop had been organized for the members of Future Generation Farmers Groups where 234 members of FGF groups have participated in these workshops. Through this workshop they have acquired knowledge on waste recycling, different aspects of climate change, disaster preparedness programme.

Apart from this, FGF members meet once in a week. They conduct several survey relating to environment and prepare chart and posters on this subject. They were also engaged in different social activities through out the year. They participated in the programme on important days related to environment like as Earth Day, World Environment Day, Meen Mangal (Fish Preservation), World Water Day, World Forest Day, International day of Climate change etc.

### **Greening India Programme**

Every year Manab Jamin tried to increase the plant population as well as develop the waste land through plantation. During this year Manab Jamin planted fruit trees at the sand bed of Ajoy River bank. The objective of this programme is to improve awareness among the villagers on plantation of trees and increase the plant population. During this year Manab Jamin have mobilized the villagers for promotion of orchard through plantation of fruit trees. 14 farmers of 2 villages have demonstrated the orchard garden and covered 1.5 hectare of land where they planted 538 nos, of fruit trees like mango, coconut, guava and lemon. Apart from these, five thousand seedlings of social forestry (fuel, fodder & timber) planted and covered 3.125 ha of non cultivated land. Manab Jamin have also mobilized for two tier cropping system at the same area.

### **Training on Pisciculture**

Manab Jamin had organized the training of Pisciculture for the youth & members of SHG. The idea of this programme is to develop the knowledge among unemployed youth on pisciculture and adopt the knowledge on fish farming. During this year, Manab Jamin has conducted 4 trainings on pisciculture where 68 nos. of youths and SHG members of 4 villages have participated. Asst. Fishery Officer, Burdwan Division was the resource person for these trainings.

### **Training on Animal Husbandry**

Manab Jamin has organised the training for the villagers of Manab Jamin project area on animal husbandry. The women, who are the members of SHG, are the participants of this training programme. The idea of the programme is to improve the knowledge on primary Poultry and Duckery Management and increase the level of income through this programme. The women have acquired the knowledge on primary

poultry and duckery management, outbreak of infectious diseases for ducks and chicks and its. The effect of the training is that the women can control the outbreak of infectious disease of ducks and chicks.

During this year, Manab Jamin has conducted 5 nos. of training on Animal Husbandry for the members of SHG women of 5 villages. A Professional Qualified Veterinary Doctor was the resource person. 101 women of 5 villages participated in this training.

### **Ecology and Natural Resource Education (ENRE)**

Manab Jamin has organized 3 Eco Groups under ENRE with the assistance from Development Research Communication and Service Center. There are average 25 members in each group. Members of all Eco Groups have been involved in doing the work on environmental issues. During this year, 6 members of 3 Eco Groups have participated in a child camp at Indian Institute of Training and Development and 9 members have participated in the child camp at Digha. Through the participation in child camp, the members had shared their knowledge and boost up their capacity. Throughout the year they have conducted survey on local marketing, social customs, rituals etc and prepared chart, posters and booklets on the related subject.

### **AEON Plantation Project**

During this year, Manab Jamin has taken an initiative for plantation programme at the waste land. The idea of this programme is to increase the green area through plantation of fuel, fruits, fodder and timber trees. DRCSC had supported this programme financially and technically. At the beginning, DRCSC had conducted a training programme with 2 Eco Group members. Nearly 3 hectare of land had been covered under this programme. Parents of the Eco group members have been involved in this plantation programme.

### **Consumer Protection Right**

As a general consumer, people are always deprived in daily life while purchasing consumable goods. Most of the people have no idea regarding the protection of the consumer from deprivation. During this year, Manab Jamin had organized 36 awareness meetings on Consumer Protection Rights at 25 villages under Bolpur Sub Division. We organize this programme to create awareness among the people regarding Consumer Protection Act. This programme was organized in collaboration with the Dept. of Consumer Affairs & Fair Business Practices, Govt. of West Bengal.

### **Conserve Water Resources and Use of Water Judiciously**

Manab Jamin Project is situated at the semi arid zone. The people of this area are losing fresh water regularly. The people sometime faced problem on Water crisis during summer. So this is the time to create awareness among the villagers to Conserve Water Resources and Use of Water Judiciously. During this year, Manab Jamin had conducted different meetings with the villagers and FGF Group members on this subject. There have been discussion on recharge of underground water, water purification, water filtration system, etc.

### **Combat Malnutrition**

For last two years we had started the programme on Combat Malnutrition among the children of ST, SC and other economically weaker section population under the age group 1 – 5 years at 2 villages in our Project Area. We implemented this programme under the guidance of Dr. Monika Golembiewski and got financial support from Indienhilfe e.V., Herrsching, Germany.

### **I.C.D.P.**

International Child Development Programme (I.C.D.P.) is a programme for child rearing practices by the caregivers. MJ had tried to improve the relationship between the children and parents. Due to industrialization and urbanization the parents are unable to take care of the child properly and child gets deviated from normal life. During this year, Manab Jamin had organized the ICDP training among the SHG

women in three groups in three villages where 12 to 14 women have participated in each group. Twelve sessions were organized for each group where we discussed on concept of dialogue and guide-line. MJ members have also conducted home visit for follow up the programme.

### Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra

Manab Jamin has completed 12 years of its work at the backward areas of Birbhum District, West Bengal. The area is mainly inhabited by the members of Schedule Caste and Schedule Tribe. The members of this society are basically agricultural labourer and they go out for work in the morning and leaving young children in the hands of their older ones. The older children are expected to perform all the household activities during the daytime. The situation becomes acute during the time of sowing and harvesting when the demand for agricultural labour increases. We found that the rate of absence is increased during agriculture season. The project of Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra has been designed to cater to the educational needs of the children between the age group of 3 to 5 years. At present 9 MJSKs are running at 9 villages.

The numbers of children in 9 MJSK are **254**.

From 1999-00 to 2009-10 Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra tried to develop the school going attitude & to develop the education standard up to class I standard of 712 children. Among them, 370 are Boys & 342 are girls.

The children are getting nutritious food at their school everyday. We keep records of weight and height of the children in their individual file at 3 months interval. Health check-up programme had been conducted 2 times in a year at every 6 months interval by a professional doctor. Mothers meeting are held on bi-monthly basis where they discussed about the progress of the children. At the end of the session, the teachers of MJSK got the children admitted at the local primary school. MJSK In charge visits the school regularly.

Annual sports have been organized in 4 places and annual picnic have been organized in 3 places. 8 teachers training program have been organized for 19 teachers of MJSK on teaching methodology, reporting system, maintenance of personal file for MJSK children, record keeping system of the school, accounting etc. 5 nos. of meeting have been organized for 19 teachers of MJSK on Human Rights, Child Labour, climate change & its effects, effect of HYV seed / GM crops, Right to Information Act etc. 7 trainings on Art & Dance have been organized for the teachers of MJSK.

From the year 1998-99 to 2009-10 total 941 (nine hundred and forty one) children have been admitted from primary school to high school who were the students of MJSK. Among them 21% belongs to ST, 54% belongs to SC and rest of other 25% belongs to economically weaker and minority community people.

### **Education Support Programme**

This is a regular programme of Manab Jamin where textbooks are distributed among schedule caste, schedule tribe, other backward class and economically weaker section students. During this year, 180 nos.



of students from 15 villages got textbooks. They are studying from Class VI to Under Graduate. 120 nos. of students from Class VI to Class X got textbook support, 44 nos. of students from Class XI and XII students and 16 nos. of students of Under Graduate got textbook support. This programme is partly supported by Mr. Alan Rousham, U.K., Confederation of Indian Industries and others.

From the year 2000-01 to 2009-10, total 557 (five hundred fifty seven) student got education support from Manab Jamin. Among them 25% student have passed Madhyamik, 19% student have completed Higher Secondary and 3% student completed Graduation. Rest of other 53% student are studying from Class VI to Class X and would complete Madhyamik.

### **Indienhilfe Network Against Child Labour**

As a member of Indienhilfe Network against child labour, Manab Jamin have initiated distribution of display board at the local primary school under Manab Jamin project area. Manab Jamin has distributed 14 nos. of display board. The students of respective primary school have displayed their write-ups and drawing regularly. During the month of February 2 days District Level Sensitization programme on Child Rights was organized where primary school teachers, ICDS Worker, Govt Official, PRI representatives, Representative of different CBOs & NGOs have participated in this training.

### **Support programme For Producer Group**

Fair Trade Forum –India have strengthened four producer group on capacity building. The groups have acquired the knowledge on concept of fair trade business, principle and rules of fair trade business, etc. 49 producers have participated this training in 2 batches.

In October 2009, our producer have participated a fair at Ice Skating Rink, Kolkata organized by Sasha supported by Fair Trade Forum – India The groups have sold nearly Rs. 60,000.00 worth of material.
