The above prayer we took from Mother Teresa’s daily prayer and we printed the same in our Annual Report 1992 – 93. We believe in our long journey of social reform there is no room for despair.

For the last several years in our front page we are boldly claiming, “Together we can”. Our faith has sustained the same.

We are not at all remorseful that one of our major funding friends has taken leave at the year end, it is within their purview.

Departure of an insignificant number of members and workers has not been able to make any dent and we have the turbulent journey towards our eventual goals.

With a clarion call of forgive and forget, we start our Annual Report in seriatim

### **AGRICULTURE : Our way of life**

Agriculture statistically sustains our largest number of population. In our initial period, we became a member of International Federation of Organic Agriculture Movement (IFOAM). Out of our sheer faith and conviction we got closely associated with Tagore Society (TSRD) inviting Masanoba Fukuoka, the legendary writer of One Straw Revolution.

We took a pioneering role in promoting Organic Jute cultivation. The present year is the successive fourth year of organic jute cultivation. The better price in organic jute encourages farmers in organic jute production.

The Ganges Jute Mill Private Limited purchases jute in cash from our local Dharmagola. Soon the sale proceeds will cross worth of ten million rupees.

Central Research Institute of Jute for Allied Fiber (CRIJAF) has not only opened its gate of expertise but also of other support.

The concerned jute mill has found a better market and the organic fibre has proved its worthiness. This year 459 farmers have cultivated organic jute on their 785 bighas of land, after signing agreement papers.

We are one of the proud partners of Institute for Integrated Rural Development (IIRD) Maharashtra. Their support has enabled us to bring organic vegetables produced by small and marginal farmers in the larger market. This effort benefits farmers by getting better price and the city consumers get healthier products.

We are already on the move to form a Network of Natural Farmers Clubs. In this scenario NABARD has a nourishing role to play.

Our attachment to produce and popularize medicinal plants is already established. Dr. Dulal Paul has kindly played a pivotal role as an expert in training seventy eight villagers of Atghara and Farmania in creating

thirty eight numbers of medicinal gardens under Jasaikathi, Atghara Gram Panchayet and Farmania Gram Panchayet.

We supplied Aloe vera, Gulancha, Tulsi etc. among the medicinal garden owners.

### **Organic Fodder Cultivation**

For maintenance of sound health of cattle organic fodder input is needed Organic fodder cultivation is required to improve the fertility of cattle population by reducing the use of chemical fertilizers. To control some diseases and pests of the crop, organic input is needed.

This year we had collected five types of fodder seeds from Regional Station for Forage Production and Demonstration, Kalyani, Nadia and distributed them among 23 farmers of 5 villages.

### **Technology Transfer**

Vikas Kendra has slowly developed some indigenous technology for the preparation of compost, vermicompost and liquid manure for application on the soil. This eco-friendly and less expensive method are easily accepted by the farmers. But many more demonstrations are needed for total acceptance.

Students of BCKV and IGNOU made 2 exposure visits at the organic farmer's fields led by Prof. Mahadev Pramanick, Training Coordinator, IGNOU.

### **Paddy –cum – Fish cultivation**

This programme was started in 2009 and continued at the village Dwip Media participated by 6 farmers covering almost 2 hectares of land. The results are encouraging.

### **Internal Control System (ICS)**

It is very important that farmers remain truthful and loyal while promoting organic agriculture. Ministry of Agriculture developed this Internal Control System so that some control system takes place under this project, we brought 1500 farmers and train them properly in Baduria and Swarupnagar block. Farmers belonging to 15 villages brought their 654 hectares of land under organic cultivation. The organic farmers have opened a small organic shop at Hakimpur. This Internal Control System is finding its root.

### **Coconut Cultivation**

Our relation with the Coconut Development Board is age old and time tested. They have trained our personnel. Unfortunately this year our response was not adequate. Next year we will take care of our mistakes.

We know all the parts of the coconut are useful. We have started making useful ornaments and other beautiful utility goods from the coconut shell. We have to utilize fully all the skills of the Board for the benefit of coconut growers. From our own small nursery we have distributed only 105 coconut plants to the 23 farmers in subsidized price.

### **Exhibition**

In our traditional Titumeer Fair one of the accepted exposures is the exhibition of the organic agricultural products. On the specific farmers day 219 organic farmers participated to listen Prof Mahadev Pramanick and Prof Paritosh Ghanti and other agriculture specialists from BCKV. This year also we participated in Banipur Lok Utsav with our stall where 97 farmers presented their products for exhibition. In another exhibition at Bhandar Kona, Nadia. 27 organic vegetables were presented.

### **Agriculture Extension Centre (AEC)**

In the season of Aman and Rabi crops oilseeds and vegetables had been cultivated in the vacant places in between mango trees in 8 bighas of land in our AEC. The 4 farmers utilized organic methods showing correctness of the system, encouraging neighborhood farmers to follow the suit. Utilization of Neem oil for the control of pest and other diseases proved its efficacy.

Farmers from SHG visited our AEC and other organic farms as exposure visit, earned experience and felt inspired.

### **Campus Development**

The Campus of Vikas Kendra nourishes its own Nursery of various fruit trees, Black peppers, timber plants and popular medicinal plants. Our Nursery is the source of sale and distribution of these plants.

Our Agriculture Department in the past years gave sustained support for dhaincha cultivation, popularization kalmi saak and other vegetables.

From all these experiences we have to chart a popular roadmap for organic cultivation.

### **ANANDA KENDRA: Centre of Joy**

Almost twenty years ago we took a major and bold decision to create an adobe of unfortunate senior citizens, tortured women, orphans and child labour.

All these hapless sections of the Society give emotional and other mutual support to each other and gather needed joy of life.

We have already been able to educate these children from unfortunate families, restored dignity to the violated women and could make lives tolerable to some senior citizens.

A planned new structure for the Rehabilitation of the Child Labour (RCL) is sheltering almost a dozen of child labours. They are dreaming of their better days. They are going to local schools and we have a plan to impart vocational training to them and their they would be able to earn their livelihood after attaining adulthood.

Out of a generous bounty of our one Life Member we have been able to build a cottage naming Neel Dadur Kutir, a hub of cultural activates of the inmates of Ananda Kendra.

Observance of Bengali New Year, Buddha Purnima, Birthday of Great Persons, regularly makes the hub lively and joyful.

‘Pratyush’ an organisation of Barasat, promoting communal harmony, supporting children and women, joins almost all major functions at Neel Dadur Kutir. Our children also participate in their activities.

‘Bhaiphonta’ and ‘Rakhi Bandhan’ popular celebrations of the Bengalees, bringing all brothers and sisters closer celebrated with much pomp and affection.

Some of our women inmates come under the project Short Stay Home of the Ministry of Women and Child Welfare, deserves mention. We remain eager to increase the number of inmates under Short Stay Home. Often due to delayed Govt. assistance, rising cost of daily life, Medical expenses for the treatment of the ailing inmates sometimes become difficult to bear. But still the solicited support of our friends, the green and spacious ambience of Ananda Kendra, the smiling expression and thank you of departing friends make our Ananda Kendra a flagship of success and social service.

More than fifty inmates of Ananda Kendra never appear to us a liability.

### **WOMEN HELPLINE:**

In our initial Annual Reports we have always specifically mentioned of the distress of womanhood in our area.

Fortunately for the last more than one decade our Women Helpline has given immense support to the distressed women. It is a Central Govt. Project to protect neglected women in the male dominated society.

Particularly in our rural area 3 trained women attend Helpline office with a live telephone line to answer any distress call of endangered woman. It may be for immediate rescue, for hospitalisation or for shelter. Our Short Stay Home project of Ananda Kendra always remains at hand to provide shelter.

Women and girls facing emotional problems like loneliness, depression, interpersonal conflict, suicidal tendencies and so on find our Helpline a dependable resort.

Police friends render their assistance if required.

Our telephone line 10926 and 03216 – 220635 are ready to respond.

During 2010-11 we received 103 cases. Out of these, we could close 49 cases; the remaining 54 cases have been referred to the helpful higher Authorities.

Amongst 103 cases 77 cases are maladjustment with the husband and in-laws, in 6 cases women required shelter along with their children, 9 cases required legal assistance.

All these reflect social maladies.

## **HELPLINE'S WORK METHODOLOGY**

Every person approaching Helpline for assistance is important and unique. The women may just want to ventilate their problems. They are to be attended with due care.

Helpline is a participatory intervention process of finding a just and permanent solution. The line has also a strategic network to bring out permanent solution and provide required help within her means. Helpline also undertake follow-up process until a solution is found out. Regular contact is maintained via telephone; so that bitterness is soothed.

The upgrading of Data Bank is helpful for referral cases. Baduria Police Station is helpful. Their assistance is to be recorded.

The Helpline has conducted 32 Awareness Programme regarding Women Rights. Also 5 programmes on Legal Counselling with the help of National University of Juridical Sciences, of India.

To make our Society better we need many prolonged innovative approaches. Helpline is one of such. We have sweet experience of success so far.

All related actors deserve our genuine thanks on behalf of the crying women whose tears we could wipe out.

## **HEALTH AND MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOAL (MDG)**

We have tried to understand the broad canvas of creating better health and tried to fit in our medical service properly.

We are member of various Network of medical services and our inputs get enriched materially and philosophically.

We would report the activities in 2 major parts, curative and preventive.

Curative – We have some regular clinics which provide curative services.

#### First Air Service

Total 134 cases were handled; male 78 and female 56. Out of them 67 were given tetanus toxide injection.

It is important that the centre remains open all the time to render positive First Aid Services.

Further, due to our more than 2 decades of existence and various connections we could refer various cases to important consultants for their free service.

### Preventive

#### A. Immunization

44 camps were organised and at Vikas Kendra and at adjacent village where 2533 children were immunized against various diseases as per Government norms.

#### B. Pulse Polio

Pulse Polio Camps took place at Atghara village and eight other hamlets, 342 children were attended. 652 families have been visited 3 times to cover drop out children.

#### C. Special Campaign for Sanitation and Safe drinking water

Nine awareness programme for Sanitation and Safe drinking water were organised through Child Development project in 24 hamlets of 19 villages under 4 blocks covering 10 panchayets. Total 256 people participated in these programme.

#### D. School Health Programme :

32 guardians meeting in 24 hamlets of 19 villages heard our workers discussing sanitation, immunization family health and other related issues. To arrest Tuberculosis various methods were heard by 531 guardians our campaign was part of Revised National Tuberculosis Control Programme (RNTCP), Baduria Primary Health Centre extended their active support, German Leprosy and T.B. Relief Association, School Teachers, ICDS workers, all ensured 619 participants.

#### E. Training on Smokeless Chula

Our leadership in this area is already established. In 5 nos. Of trainings were conducted on fuel efficient smokeless Chula; where 92 women were trained including some of our staff.

This training will save partly environment, positively on an average 50% of fuel, keep the household clean and spread of cancer of the ladies facing the fire

#### G. Management of Malnourished Children :

The precondition of healthy nation is the growth of healthy children, both physically and mentally.

Dr. Muktipada Basak, Physician of local hospital not only treated 352 malnourished children in 5 Health Camps but 44 malnourished children were identified, special care was taken and mothers were given specific advice.

#### H. Mothers' Meeting

432 mothers were assembled at location based 23 meetings and listened on various subjects like food habits, nutrition, personal hygiene, immunization, sanitation etc. They were motivated in practice these advices in the family.

#### I. Eye Check up Camp

One Eye Specialist from Eye Care and Research Centre Calcutta regularly comes to Vikas Kendra every month to treat the eye ailments of local people.

Dr. Sankar Saha treated 51 patients during the year.

#### J. Mobile Health Camps

10 nos. Of Mobile Health Check up camps were organised by Vikas Kendra. In these camps Dr. Mukti Pada Basak attended 507 patients. In these camps different diagnosis were given such as tendency of vitamin deficiency, weakness, worm infection, indigestion, diarrhoea, malnutrition etc.

#### K. Basic Health Care and Support Programme

We have kept in mind the priorities of MDG. As a member of North 24 Parganas District Health Forum, we follow a comprehensive health programme but different focuses get different emphasis.

Belgium funded MEMISA and DGCD facilitated by West Bengal Voluntary Health Association (WBVHA) remains our immediate guiding platform. By implementing National Rural Health Mission (NRHM) of Govt. of India, since 2005, with a specific guideline we follow and implement our Health Activities.

Rural people needs specific health service, the Govt. Health Service System is our guiding principles.

38 Community Awareness on various Govt. Health facilities and their accessibilities are popularised. With the specific intention we have organised nearly thousand people to tap the resources of MDG.

Our all these inputs are to honour MDG.

### **EDUCATION : Building the Nation**

The whole nation has dedicated itself in "Sarva Siksha Avijan". But the goal of total literacy is still far off.

In North 24 Parganas the primary statistics of 2011 census reveals that the literacy of the district is 84.95%. It is an improvement from 78.07% of 2001.

In Birbhum it is 70.90% in 2011, an improvement from 61.48% in 2001.

For the total literacy still we have to go a long way. Out of four persons still one is illiterate, one lesson is clear; it took more than Sixty years to achieve this comparative success but hundred percent achievements is far off.

In our project area of Vikas Kendra, Atghara in Baduria Block we have 22 tuition centers, 22 trained and dedicated teachers work 6 days in a week and 3 hours a day.

Assessment of progress is conducted regularly.

Concerned teachers are subjected to progressive fruitful training by regular assessment of students they taught. 523 students undergone regular coaching but only 466 students showed their results better. 61 students got grade A, 138 got grade B, 119 got grade C, 109 got grade D and 65 got grade E and 5 got F.

To make education all embracing we made efforts to involve all the guardians arranged 31 guardians meeting and 610 guardians attended these meetings, the need and role of Tuition centers, role of guardians, issues of child labours, mid-day meal, Right to free & compulsory Education all these related issues were parts of the discussion with the guardians.

The teachers were motivated to visit the families of students for keeping lively contact with them. 784 visits were made. Results were praiseworthy. 185 irregular students became regular.

22 numbers of village awareness programmes were organised. Campaign was initiated against child labour. Drop outs were impressed to attend school regularly.

One of our thrust was to Strengthen Local Institutions (SLI). Our staff attended 19 meetings convened by Primary Schools and other Authorities.

To solve local problems, our constructive suggestions were largely accepted.

We have conducted 15 Nature Study Clubs on fortnightly basis in 22 Tuition Centers. Students were taught how to make survey, uses of the waste materials, useful role of the trees in our daily life.

In our Tuition Centers, as a part of value education, the lives of Great men, Leaders like Nehru, Martyr Titumeer and religious leaders were discussed.

27 community meeting were organised, attended by 654 villagers discussions were around Child Rights Protection Bill, Education Bill etc.

Sublimely we can be proud of our Shaheed Titumeer Library. This Library has already assisted several students who have able to put their mark on their way to life. Magazines both traditional and modern have specific attractions. Thousands of books have its own charm and utility but our desire to make it a beehive of all kinds of readers is yet to be fulfilled.

Vikas Kendra is associated with various networks. Indienhilfe sponsored Network against Child Labour, Environment Nature Research and Education (ENRE), West Bengal Education Network (WEBEN) and Right to Food and Work Network are foremost in our all embracing drive.

Sri S. Ramesh, a resource person from M V Foundation, Andhra Pradesh is close associated with our drive against Child Labour.

In our first Annual Report, 1986-87 under Education and Culture we did mention the philosophy of Paulo Eerier. Now keeping our faith in his philosophy we have broaden our horizon with inputs of Tagore and Gandhi.

## **MANAB JAMIN PROJECT 2010-11**

### **Geographic Description:**

Manab Jamin a project of Society for Equitable Voluntary Actions situated at Mirzapur village of Birbhum District and Suri-Bolpur plain. The general slope is north-west to south-east. At the south, the Ajay River

dominates the landscape with its shallow and sandy beds, kilometers across at places. The soil found in this region varies from red sandy, red loamy older alluvium in the south western to brown and recent alluvium in the central and south eastern part. The distance from Kolkata Airport to Manab Jamin project area is 172 kilometers and from Howrah Railway station to Bolpur Santiniketan station is 156 kilometers of North West.

### **Field of Service:**

Manab Jamin has crossed its one decade of services in Bolpur Sriniketan block of Birbhum District of West Bengal. Manab Jamin is working at 15 villages of 4 Gram Panchayet (5 villages in Ruppur Gram Panchayet, 7 villages in Raipur-Supur Gram Panchayet, 2 villages in Sattore Gram Panchayet and 1 village in Kankalitala Gram Panchayet) at Bolpur-Sriniketan Block. The project covered 3533 families in fifteen villages. Out of this, 1472 families have their own lands (42%), 458 families are sharecroppers (13%) and the rest 1603 families are land less (45%). In caste wise 841 no. of families schedule tribe (23%), 1544 no of families schedule caste (44%), 1148 no. of families OBC and general (32 %).

Manab Jamin is working on the field of Sustainable Agriculture, Education, Environment, Health, Animal Husbandry, Self Help Group, etc. of its project area. The main target population is ST, SC and economically weaker section of the people in the community.

### **AGRICULTURE**

#### **GREEN MANURE IN AMON PADDY**

Manab Jamin has given advice for organic farming from the very beginning but the supply of organic inputs was not sufficient. So Manab Jamin has introduced (Dhaincha) green manure application during the last four years, which should be the source of organic manure. During this year 20 farmers have made this demonstration in their field and covered 3 hectares of land.

#### **BIO FERTILIZER APPLICATION IN AMON PADDY**

Due to excessive use of chemical fertilizers and chemical pesticides, the quantity of beneficial microorganisms has decreased in the soil and the soil has become hard and infertile, which affects agricultural production. The microorganism which enriches the soil by making available nitrogen through fixation and supply of Phosphorus by soluble Phosphates fixed in the soil. The advantages of use of bio fertilizers in soil are well known and apart from supplying nutrients, further increases organic matter, enzymes, hormones etc. It also reduces the use of chemical fertilizers for agricultural production. During this year 47 farmers have made this demonstration in their field and covered 8.2 hectare of land.

#### **COMMERCIAL VEGETABLE CULTIVATION ORGANICALLY BY SHG WOMEN**

Manab Jamin has undertaken programme on Commercial Vegetable Cultivation organically by SHG women for the last two years. During this year 7 women of SHG under Manab Jamin Project Area have grown vegetables organically and commercially during Amon season. Among them 2 women have got good yield, which is marketable. At the same time 7 women have participated in commercial vegetable cultivation programme during pre Khariff season in 4 villages. Almost all the participants have got good yield and marketed it and got better price to sell at local market.

#### **INTRODUCTION OF CROP ROTATION**

Manab Jamin project area is rainfed monocrop area. Paddy is the only crop. Manab Jamin tried to introduce second crop partly after harvesting of aman paddy. During this year Manab Jamin distributed 255 Kg of wheat among 34 farmers, 131 kg of mustard among 120 farmers and 80 kg of lentil among 40 farmers for Rabi crop production at 10 villages and demonstrated at their agricultural land. It was found out that the

farmers have harvested in rainwater and used as irrigation from canal, river & pond, also used cowdung, mustard oil & bio gas slurry through the follow up of the programme.

#### BLACK GRAM DEMONSTRATION PROGRAMME

Black Gram Demonstration Programme has been introduced for improvement of soil fertility and development of fallow land and at the same time it increased the pulse production in the area. During this year 13 farmers from two villages have participated in this programme. 0.65 hectare of land has been covered by this programme.

#### TURMERIC DEMONSTRATION

Turmeric demonstration programme was undertaken during this year. Manab Jamin encourage the village women to undertake this demonstration programme. In this programme 104 women have participated. 152 kg seeds have been distributed among 104 women of 7 villages under Manab Jamin project area.

#### MUSHROOM DEMONSTRATION PROGRAMME

Mushroom cultivation's economic importance lies primarily in its use as food for human consumption. It is one of the programmes of Manab Jamin. Oyster mushroom is grown at moderate temperature ranging from 20<sup>0</sup> C to 30<sup>0</sup> C and humidity 55-70% for a period of 2 to 4 months in the project villages.

This year spawn was distributed among 66 numbers of women farmers from 4 villages, most of them are landless and SHG members.

#### RELAY CROPPING

In order to grow two crops in place of one grown, now by utilizing the existing resources (rain-fed) by taking a second crop, which is sown in the standing Aman paddy crop before harvest, and the second crop continues to grow after harvesting of Aman paddy utilizing the residual moisture and nutrients.

This year 41 farmers of 4 villages adopted this technique, where Tori Mustard was grown. 37.8 kg of seeds broadcasted before harvesting of Amon paddy.

## MIXED CROPPING

The main thrust of this programme is to convert from mono crop to double crop within the same resources Manab Jamin has started to cultivate second crop within the residual moisture. It has introduced to grow pulses and oil seeds together within the residual moisture after harvesting of paddy.

During this year 7 farmers have participated in this demonstration programme where they sown Lentil with Tori together. It covered 0.29 ha under this programme.

## BACKYARD ORCHARD

This is one of the popular & environment protection programmes of Manab Jamin. Manab Jamin has distributed fruit trees among the villagers. The objective of this programme is to provide additional nutrition at their regular food consumption. This year Manab Jamin has distributed 1752 nos. of fruit trees among 362 nos. of villagers under Mamab Jami project area. *The details are given below.*

## SOCIAL FORESTRY

The main idea of the programme is to develop the green area and to create awareness among the villagers on plantation of trees to increase the plant population. This is also part to combat climate change programme. During this year 10000 social forestry seedlings had been raised. 5 farmers of 5 villages have received 1559 numbers of social forestry seedlings. At the end of the year, it is found that the survival rate is 36.56 % due to scarcity of rain.

## KITCHEN GARDEN

This is one of the popular programmes under Manab Jamin Project Area. The idea of this programme is to propagate the homestead kitchen garden, which would be the source of nutritional supply for the family as well as secondary source of earning. Manab Jamin had supplied seeds and seedlings 3 times in a year like as

Kharif, Rabi and Pre Kharif season. The women have used liquid organic manure and liquid organic pesticides in kitchen garden. During this year, 309 nos. of women have demonstrated the kitchen garden programme in Khariff season and 397 nos of Women have demonstrated kitchen garden programme in Rabi season. The production of vegetables had enriched their diet. Few women have earned some money by selling a part of the production.

### TRAINING ON MEDICINAL PLANTS

This is one of the important programmes under Manab Jamin. Generally Manab Jamin provided this training for the women. Families are looked after by the women of our society. So Manab Jamin tried to increase the skill of the women through the training on medicinal plants

During this year, 11 nos of meetings have been organized at 11 villages. These have been discussed on use of locally available medicinal plants for prevention of primary illness. 136 no of women have participated in these training programmes.

### SELF HELP GROUP

All development agencies put the emphasis on SHG. This concept is much well known. Manab Jamin had started this programme from 2003 for livelihood upliftment, food security, self confidence and financial inclusion. At present total number of SHG under Manab Jamin is 76 among them 58 groups are for women and rests of 18 are for men. 861 villagers have been involved in these different SHG groups. The majority of the members are belonging to Scheduled Caste community and the number is 407.

The SHG members are engaged with different income generation programmes like as Agriculture, Animal Husbandry, Pisciculture, Small Scale Business, Cottage Industry, Social Forestry Plantation etc.

### HEALTH AWARENESS PROGRAMME

This programme is for the mothers and children of Manab Jamin Project Area. The idea of this programme is to create awareness among the women on health, hygiene and sanitation. There have been discussions on family planning, immunization, nutrition, personal health & hygiene etc. A qualified doctor conducts this awareness programme. During this year 3 nos. of training has been organized at three different villages under Manab Jamin project area for the women and involving 83 women. The health In charge conducted 16 nos. of health awareness meetings at twelve different villages under Manab Jamin project area, where 186 women have participated. There were discussions on how to combat population explosion, immunization, child health care etc.

#### WATER PURIFICATION

The water of wells and tube wells had been treated by bleaching powder with lime during rainy season every year. A repeat application is done after rain. The main idea of this programme is to prevent the outbreak of water borne diseases. During this year 80 wells and 202 tube well water have been treated by bleaching powder and lime for prevention of water borne diseases at twelve villages with the help of Eco group members.

#### FUTURE GENERATION FARMERS GROUP

Ecological movement has started under Manab Jamin since last 9 years. At present 15 eco groups are working actively under fourteen village of Manab Jamin. The idea to promote Eco Group is to create awareness against environment pollution and to grow habit for tree plantation to protect the environment. The members of Eco group are in the age group of 12 to 18 years and students from class VI to X the most of the eco-group members belong to farmers' family & day labourers family.

F G F Group members meet once in a week. They have conducted several surveys related to environment and prepared charts and posters on different subjects. They are also engaged in different social activities throughout the year. They participated in the programme of important days related to environment like Earth Day, World Environment Day, Meen Mangal, World Water Day, World Forest Day etc.

#### GREENING INDIA PROGRAMME

This programme is funded by the Japanese Business Communities through Tagore Society for Rural Development. The objective of this programme is to improve awareness among the villagers on the need for plantation of trees and increase the plant population and green area, resulting better livelihood.

During this year, Manab Jamin has mobilized the villagers for promotion of orchard through plantation of fruit trees. 10 farmers of 3 villages have demonstrated the orchard garden and covered 1.3 hectare of land where they planted 684 nos, of fruit trees like mango, coconut, guava and lemon. Apart from these, ten

thousand seedlings of social forestry (fuel, fodder & timber) raised which are planted and covered 6.334 ha of non cultivated land.

### ECOLOGY AND NATURAL RESOURCE EDUCATION (ENRE)

Manab Jamin has run 3 Eco Groups under ENRE with the assistance from Development Research Communication and Service Center. There are average 25 members in each group. Members of all Eco Groups have been involved in doing the work on environmental issues. During this year, 7 members of 3 Eco Groups have participated in a child camp at DRCSC's Bolpur Office. Through the participation of child camp, the members have shared their knowledge and boost up their capacity. Throughout the year they have conducted baseline survey and prepared base map, resource map (present and 30 years ago), history of the village through time-line, problem identification and its cause and effect analysis, solution matrix etc. and documented at the Topic Booklet prepared by themselves.

### CONSERVE WATER RESOURCES AND USE OF WATER JUDICIOUSLY

The world is facing water crisis enhanced day by day. Water has become a dear commodity and the poor people are losing access to fresh water. On the other hand, due to urbanization and population growth we are losing our fresh water resources and going to face a severe crisis very soon.

Manab Jamin project is in almost semi arid zone where the people are losing the fresh water day by day. Now the time has come to move the people to aware "conserve water resource and use water judiciously". During this year, Manab Jamin have conducted 3 nos. of meeting under its project area at 3 villages on conserve water resource and use water judiciously in presence of village women, youth leaders and Panchayet members. 116 members had participated in this programme.

### RIGHT BASED APPROACH

#### FARMERS CLUB

National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD) encourages banks to promote Farmers' Clubs in rural areas under the Farmers' Club Programme, earlier known as "Vikas Volunteer Vahini (VVV) Programme". The Programme was launched by NABARD in November 1982.

During this year, Manab Jamin had promoted 10 nos of Farmers' Clubs at 10 villages under Manab Jamin project area with the support of NABARD. All Farmers' Clubs have opened their bank account at their respective operational bank.

### SOCIAL SECURITY PROGRAMME FOR UNORGANIZED SECTOR

Manab Jamin have facilitated the social assistance scheme for the labour of Unorganized Sector with the help of Labour Department, Govt. of West Bengal. The name of the scheme is State Assisted Scheme of Provident Fund for Unorganized Workers (SASPFUW). The subscribers who are involved in self employment occupation and work at unorganized industries may get the benefit from this scheme. Through this scheme, the subscriber deposits Rs.20 per month and an equal amount has been released by the Government as Matching Contribution.

There are few eligibility criteria for the subscribers. He/She should be in between the age of 18 and 55 years. He/She should be working under the listed employments / occupations. Place of work should be in West Bengal. Average monthly income of the Worker's Family should be not more than Rs. 3500/-. Workers already covered, under the Employees' Provident Fund & Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952 are not eligible.

The other scheme is West Bengal Building and Other Construction Workers Welfare.

Every building and construction workers within the age limit of 18 to 60 years and who has worked for not less than 90 days during the preceding 12 months shall be eligible for registration as a beneficiary under this scheme. An application with necessary documents and a onetime registration fee of Rs.20/- is required. Along with it tri-monthly contribution of Rs.60/- (monthly Rs.20/-) is also to be deposited against which a receipt will be issued by the office and an equal amount has been released by the Government as Matching Contribution. The respective Bank branches will make a yearly transfer to a consolidated account.

During this year, 135 villagers have been registered under the scheme of SASPFUW of 8 villages under this Bolpur Sub Division and 126 villagers of 10 villages registered under the scheme of WBOCWW.

### CONSUMER PROTECTION RIGHT

Manab Jamin have organized awareness meetings on Consumer Protection Rights at 2 Puja Pandals at Hatrasulganj Sarbojanin Durgotsav and Nurpur Sarbojanin Durgotsav on 14<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup> & 16<sup>th</sup> October with the help of Consumer Affairs and Fair Business Practices, Birbhum Regional Office, Suri. During these days, poster exhibition was exhibited, Documentary Film was shown and Seminar was organized on Consumer Rights and its Protection. The entire programme covered a vast range of consumer which was nearly 1000.

### TRAINING CUM WORKSHOP ON CONSUMER RIGHTS

Manab Jamin had organized a 2 days training workshop for NGOs/VCOs on Consumer Awareness and Consumer Rights with the help of Consumer Education and Its Protection, Burdwan Division and Consumer Affairs and Fair Business Practices, Birbhum Regional Office, Suri. Thirty five (35) participants from different NGOs and VCOs have participated at this programme. The concerned departments, few State Government Officials were the resource persons of the aforesaid programme and enriched the participants regarding different Govt. Policies for protection of general consumer.

### AWARENESS PROGRAMME ON WOMEN EMPOWERMENT, DOWRY AND EARLY MARRIAGE

During this year, Bolpur Manab Jamin has organized a daylong awareness programme on women empowerment, dowry and early marriage with the help of Sub-Divisional Information and Cultural Office of Bolpur Sub-Division. Sub-Divisional Officer of Bolpur Sub-Division, Additional District Judge of Bolpur Court, District Information and Cultural Officer, Birbhum District, Sub-Divisional Information and Cultural Officer of Bolpur Sub-Division spoke on these subjects. SHG members, youth leaders, villagers have participated in these programmes. A documentary film on the above mentioned subject has been shown. Ninety five persons participated in the programme.

### LEGAL LITERACY AWARENESS PROGRAMME

During this year, a awareness programme on legal literacy has been organized. Sub Divisional officer of Bolpur Sub-Division, Additional District Judge & First Track Sub Divisional Judge of Bolpur Court and Assistant Labour Commissioner spoke on the importance of the programme. Seventy one villagers, members of Bolpur Manab Jamin participated in this programme. A session on question and answer between the speakers and audience have been organized at the end of the programme.

### INTERNATIONAL CHILD DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

International Child Development Programme (I.C.D.P.) is a programme for child rearing practices by the caregivers through this programme Manab Jamin had tried to improve the relationship between the children and parents. Due to industrialization and urbanization the parents are unable to take care of the child properly and children are deviated from normal life. During this year, Manab Jamin has organized the ICDP training among the SHG women in three groups. 12 sessions were organized for each group where we discussed on the concept of dialogue and guideline of ICDP.

### **MANAB JAMIN SHISHU KENDRA**

Manab Jamin has completed 12 years of its work in the backward areas of Birbhum District, West Bengal. The area is mainly dominated by the Schedule Caste and Schedule Tribe population. The members of this

society are basically agricultural labourer and they go out for work in the morning and leaving young children in the hands of their older ones. The older children are expected to perform all the household activities during the daytime. The situation becomes acute during the time of sowing and harvesting when the demand for agricultural labour increases. We found that the rate of absence is increased during agriculture season.

The project of Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra has been designed to cater the educational needs of the children between the age group of 3 – 5 years. At present 9 MJSK are running at 9 villages under Manab Jamin Project Area. Each centre has got two teachers, while the Supur MJSK at Supur village has 3 teachers. The working hours of these centers are generally 3 hours in the morning. Nutritious food is served to the children in the school. The teaching methodology is followed as per training obtained in Loreto Day School, Shealdah and generally addressed with flower, fruit, taste sound of different materials and techniques. The syllabus is followed for two years preparing for pre-primary school. When the children leave the school, the teacher takes them for admission to their nearest primary school for further education.

Our teachers arrange monthly Mothers Meeting with the mothers of MJSK children's mother. It is an important step to run the MJSK in a proper way. Subjects discussed in the meeting are food & nutrition, immunization, cleanliness, preventive care, care of various diseases, teaching methods, good habits, Self Help Group (SHG) etc. Mothers are encouraged to attend such meetings to make them understand that they are also part of our MJSK.

Home visit is also an important part to for smooth running of MJSK. Our teachers have made these visits. The main thrust of this programme is to ensure regular attendance of the children and rapport building with the family members and take personal interest with the mothers to share their personal problems.

MJSK In-charge visits the centers regularly to ensure smooth running of MJSK centers. Regular health check up has been done by a physician. The doctor visits two times in a year in each centre. The teachers have kept the record of height and weight of every child in every month. Regular nutritious food is provided to the children.

Every year, we arrange annual sports for the children of MJSK. This year annual sports took place on 4 different dates in the month of December 2010 at Nurpur, Mirzapur, Paruldanga and Binuria. We organize annual picnic for the children of MJSK. All students and teachers of MJSK, other Manab Jamin staff members and some of youth leaders also participate in the picnic.

Six Teachers Training Program had been organized for 19 teachers of MJSK on teaching methodology, reporting system, maintenance of personal file for MJSK children, record keeping system of the school, accounting etc. Six nos. of meeting had been organized for 19 teachers of MJSK on Human Rights, Child Labour, Climate change & its effects, effect of HYV seed / GM crops, Right to Information Act etc. Eleven trainings on Art & Dance had been organized for the teachers of MJSK.

The total number of children in 9 MJSK is **246**. The details are given in the following table:

## INDIENHILFE NETWORK AGAINST CHILD LABOUR

Manab Jamin is a member of Indienhilfe Network Against Child Labour (IHNACL). Some untruth crept in, particularly in the story of the Vikas Kendra's early childhood. Some people got avoidable importance. We admit our mistakes.

### **Epilogue :**

We have completed twenty six years of our eventful existence. In a long journey, crisis is not unexpected. In previous two cases, we could dissolve by our long friendly confabulations held at Bolpur and Gobardanga. Total understanding came back and we emerged in a win-win situation.

The crisis we faced during the last few months of the previous session was of a different nature. One of our major foreign friends has normal reservation that our growth is not keeping even pace. It is debatable. We remained open for any constructive dialogue. But the event appeared in an ugly face.

The donor unfortunately engaged in a palace revolution, the foreign friends started deciding who would represent SEVA.

It is not within their rights.

The cardinal aspect of our silent protest to our Donor Agency is three fold.

- 1) They can not intervene in our internal affairs like choosing our representatives; in decision making bodies.
- 2) They cannot prohibit our General Secretary in our own Vikas Kendra while their representative is meeting the staff of Vikas Kendra.
- 3) Finally we are partners in performing agreed tasks but we have not sold our soul.

Our patriotic urge, national commitment took us to a right position. We felt and decided, uncertainty of the situation will be for a short period. With heads high we will overcome. We will not submit to unquestioned dictation with slave mentality.

The Donor Agency has chosen one of our ex-staff, who will head their new initiative of Child Centre Development knowing fully well; he has failed miserably to submit proper accounts of small savings scheme of Vikas Kendra which was in his hand for more than a decade.

Let this new platform be headed by a person who miserably failed to maintain and submit accounts of people's money despite opportunities given to him to come out clean.

So, finally we are closing our door to the chosen person of foreign friends. Let the money glitter to the minuscule number of friends.

We are happy to report all our friends of Manab Jamin and also some of Vikas Kendra stood solidly behind principles, slowly some other friends of Vikas Kendra also followed them.

A special resolution already on the table indicates the steps in the offing. We are closing our Annual Report of twenty sixth year of our service with dedication as it was when we started our journey from a mud hut.

The steel frame of idealism remains untarnished.
