

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Introduction



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YIKAS KENDRA

Vikas Kendra started journey for rural development in the year 1985. Vikas Kendra has been performing Social work in the field of Agriculture, Health, Education, Women Empowerment, SHG Environment etc. for last 31 years. It is a Civil Society Organization based in Baduria Block and working in surrounding 3 Blocks in North 24 Parganas with synergic association with various National and International developmental Agencies.



In total there are 579 farmers (in 129.83 ha. land) who are under agreement with us to produce Jute, vegetables and field crops using only Organic manures and Organic pesticides to eradicate diseases caused due to inorganic pesticides. They are spread over 17 villages in Baduria and Deganga Block. Out of these farmers some are engaged in producing Phosphocompost, Vermi-compost, Liquid manure, Green manure for their own use. All the organic farmers are also engaged in making organic pesticides under our direction and guidance.

We are pleased to inform that our Organic farmers produced all inputs by themselves which is one of the basic principles of organic agriculture. For this purpose different types of programmes related to Organic Agriculture are being organized throughout the year.

Relay Cropping Vegetables & Mixed Cropping of Vegetables

152 demonstrations on Relay Cropping & Mixed Cropping in vegetables were done in farmers' fields in 16 villages. The total area of vegetables in this programme was 12.16 hectares. The vegetables grown were Beet, Onion, Beans, Red leafy Vegetables, Carrot, Tomato, Pumpkin, Bitter Gourd, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Radish, Green Banana, Parwal, Brinjal, Basil etc.

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Nutritional Garden

This is similar to kitchen garden. In all the kitchen gardens only organic fertilizers are used. 35 families of 7 villages have received from us 10 kinds of seeds and plants for their own kitchen gardens.

This method enabled the women farmers to augment their daily intake of vegetables in their normal meals and some of them also sold a part of produced vegetables and obtained good pocket money.

Greening India Progamme

Global Warming has set in but deforestation and cutting trees are going unabated. The embankment is being broken during high tide. To maintain the ecosystem and to save the embankment, plantation is essential on embankment and its nearby areas. We (Vikas Kendra) distributed saplings of 938 numbers of Fruit plants and 8262 Lambu & Mehagini plants among 87 farmers under GIP programme and 25kgs. seeds of babla were spread over 2 KMs of road side and 1.5Km of Ichhamoti riverside, direct seeding was done in 3 villages. 6000 timber plants and 500 fruits plants were grown in our permanent nursery. It is an ongoing programme.

1. Organic Jute

Jute happens to be a major crop for the farmers of West Bengal. Gunnies and other packing materials are made out of natural jute fiber which is now losing market in the face of synthetic alternatives. As a result the demand of Jute fiber is decreasing day by day. This is the 10th year of Organic Jute programme. Jute fiber produced organically i.e. not using any chemical fertilizers or poisonous insecticides commands a better price in the international market.

This programme was introduced by SEVA along with Ganges Jute Pvt. Ltd. The seeds, package of practice and post harvest measures were supported by CRIJAF. The product is certified by

IMO Control, the internationally reputed Certifying Agency. In this year an area of 107.2 ha. has been brought under this scheme.

Gloster Limited adopted a new village i.e. Kankarasuti under organic Jute cultivation in collaboration with SEVA. This programme has been launched by Vikas Kendra along with Gloster Limited. An area of 28.27 ha. has been brought under this scheme.

We distributed 550Kgs. of Jute seed among our 469 organic farmers supported by Ganges Jute Pvt Ltd. Hooghly and 150kgs of Jute seed among 110 new organic farmers supported by Gloster Ltd.

2. Organic Bazaar

This Organic Bazaar programme is functioning since last 14 years. One local Organic Bazaar is running at Atghara on every Monday and Friday to sell produces grown by the registered organic farmers. In addition, Organic Bazaars also have been organized at Pallisri seed corporation office, Kolkata, and Dumdum Organic Bazaar Samity. The entire organic Bazaar programme is supported by SEVA. Our Eco-volunteers organized this Bazaar programme.

3. Technology Transfer

Vikas Kendra developed some Indigenous Technology for the preparation of liquid manure for application on the crops, botanical pesticides for the control of pest and disease. These are eco-friendly.

The experts attached to SEVA conducted training programme at different places. The training details are given bellow:-

4. Exhibition

On 20th November'15 we have conducted a farmers' day programme, on utility of Animal for organic cultivation and its future, Dr. R.A. Dey, Ex Senior Scientist of NDRI & Mr Abdur Rahaman have facilitated this Programme; we also arranged an Organic Vegetables stall at Titumir fair. 36 farmers got awards for their exhibits.

21-23 December, 2015 we attended the Agriculture Fair at Iswarygacha F P School of Baduria Block and we presented a model Kitchen Garden, SRI paddy field, Compost demonstration etc.

We participated in the exhibition organized by Nagarukra Pushpa mela Committee from 31st December'15 to 3rd January'16. 24 organic farmers displayed 64 varieties of organic vegetables and fruits in the programme. Mr. Abdur Rahaman judged these exhibits and also held a farmers meeting. Mr. Abdur Rahaman summed up and made the farmers aware about this meeting. We have organised a Farmer's day programme at Nagar Ukra on Organic Cultivation.

On 1st to 8th February'16 we arranged one organic stall at Lokutsab, Banipur; near about 5000 participants visited this stall. We sold products like Peda, Jam, Jelly, organic vegetables & fruits of ₹8000/-; Abdur Rahaman, Ferdousi Bibi, Halim, Rabiul Islam, Likat Biswas & Hannan Ali of Vikas Kendra attended the

stall.

We participated in the exhibition organized by Bhandekona Milon Sangha on 15th to 18th February'2016. 28 organic farmers displayed 45 varieties of organic vegetables and fruits in the programme. Abdur Rahaman Judged the exhibits and also held a farmers meeting. Mr. Abdur Rahaman summed up and made the farmers aware about this meeting.

Farmers Awareness Meeting/Training

We organized 24 farmers meeting/training on Jute retting, Land preparation, Internal Inspection, Vermi compost making, upgrading of organic agriculture, Bio-pesticide making, Crop planning and future of organic jute.

Enhancement of livelihood security of PaschimSimla & Ghoshpur (North-24 Pgs.) farmers under Tribal Sub Plan (TSP) Supported by CRIJAF, Nilgange, Barakpore. Organised by Vikas Kendra

Ghoshpur village is located in Chatra Gram Panchayat under Baduria block of North-24 Parganas district. This village is relatively backward and not so economically sound. There are around One hundred Thirty families of scheduled tribes belonging to Sardar tribe. Major source for livelihood for these tribes in the village is farming either in their own land or in leased land. Some youths and family heads are involved in other works like masonry, private jobs in Kolkata, some are engaged in agriculture fields on daily wages and their family members also assist them by contributing in the farming to meet their livelihoods. There are around Seven Self Help Groups (SHG) in this village. Many of the tribal farm women are registered in these groups. But the activities of these groups are insignificant because of lack of sufficient trainings on various enterprises.

As per the preliminary survey of the village, the major crops grown by the villagers are jute, paddy, sesame, mustard, vegetables and some other crops. It was observed that the farmers are not following improved cultivation practices because of lack of awareness/knowledge about various improved production methods. In order to enhance the livelihood security of these tribal farmers the following interventions can be undertaken in the villages in the coming crop season.

1. Pest and Disease Management

The tribal farmers of Ghoshpur reported that there were no proper guidance given to them regarding the pest and disease management in jute and other crops. Semilooper and mite were the major pests that affected the crop in the past. Integrated pest and disease management would definitely help in increasing the profitability from jute and other crops of the area.

2. Microbial Retting

Proper retting methods were hardly followed by the jute farmers of Ghoshpur. As a result of this, the fiber quality obtained by them is very poor. In order to improve the situation, microbial talc based powder can be supplied to the farmers along with the proper retting practices which will help in faster retting and obtaining better quality fiber.

Last year we arranged many training programmes among the Paschim Simla scheduled tribes families. CRIJAF supported through Vikas Kendra by giving Jute seeds, Mustard seeds, Coriander seeds, Potato Seeds, Paddy seeds & all types of inputs among Paschim Simla scheduled tribe families. Also 360 numbers of chicks and 288 numbers of Duckling were distributed among 72 numbers of Paschim Simla scheduled tribe families. CRIJAF arranged through Vikas Kendra for vaccination to the Chicks & Ducklings round the year. Now 32% Chicks & 51% Ducklings are alive and they lay egg every day. SHG mothers get more money from Ducks and hens and ST

farmers get more money from cultivation.

All the above programmes were Organised by Vikas Kendra and Supported by CRIJAF. We organized some programmes at Paschim Simla Dighirpara. The details are given bellow:

Central Assisted Scheme—Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana (PKVY)

The State Government has been very much concerned for the

last few years over the soil health status due to intensive agricultural practices of the State. In view of this the State had taken INM programme through various Central and State Programmes to address the major problems of Soil Health Management (SHM). Upon introduction of "Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana (PKVY)" under National Mission on Sustainable Agriculture (NMSA), a Central Scheme, the State Govt. has decided to promote organic farming in the selected districts through this project during 2015-16 with the objective of

- Development of organic village through on-farm Natural Resource Management for sustainable and chemical residue free agriculture production.
- Reduction of dependency on fertilizers and agro-chemicals.
- To promote commercial production under organic concept.
- Expansion of area under organic cultivation through PGS certification for development of domestic organic market source for the benefit of farmers.

Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana (PKVY): PKVY, an elaborated component under SHM of major project NMSA, envisages Organic Agriculture for production of agriculture products free from chemicals and pesticide residues by adopting eco-friendly low cost technologies where organic farming is promoted through adoption of organic village by cluster approach and PGS certification.

As per G.O.l. NMSA Guidelines the Soil Health Management (SHM) component including PKVY will be governed at the district level by the District Monitoring Committee (DMC). The Government of West Bengal selected 2 clusters (50 farmers in each group), one is Panji and And the other is Manab Jamin located at Mirzapur village of Bolpur-Sriniketan block under Birbhum, West Bengal in collaboration with Vikas Kendra. All the groups were looked after by Vikas Kendra Agriculture Department.

Panji and Jangalpur villages are located in Jadurhati Gram Panchayat under Baduria block of North-24 Parganas district. These villages are relatively backward and not so economically sound. There are around Six hundred families of Scheduled Cast, OBC and Minority Community. Major source for livelihood for these families in the villages are farming either in their own land or in leased land. Some youths and family heads are involved in other works like masonry, private jobs in Kolkata, some are engaged in agriculture fields on daily wages and their family members also assist them by contributing in the farming to meet their livelihood. There are around forty Self Help Groups (SHG) in these villages. Many of the women are registered in these groups. But the activities of these groups are not effective because of lack of sufficient trainings on various enterprises.

As per the preliminary survey of the village, the major crops grown by the villagers are jute, paddy, sesame, mustard and other crops. It was observed that the farmers are not following improved cultivation practices because of lack of awareness/knowledge about various improved production methods. In order to enhance the livelihood security of these farmers the following interventions can be undertaken in the villages in the coming crop season.

Model demonstration—cum-Training programme for awareness about proper retting technology of Jute

Objective:-

- To develop knowledge and skill about proper retting techniques of jute fibre.
- To develop knowledge and skill about grading of jute fibre.
- To disseminate the knowledge and skills to a mass group.

Each farmer would bring raw Jute from their land near water body where Method Demonstration would be made. For this demonstration one or more numbers of water body may be selected according to the suitability and availability.

Preparation of Retting Stack (JAK)

- i) Preferably fresh water body may be selected.
- ii) In every jute bundle few stems of 'Dhaincha' or 'Barbati' may be inserted for quick & uniform retting.
- iii) Jute bundles may be assorted by traditional way or any convenient way.
- iv) After assortment of Jute bundles, a layer of water plants, water hyacinth etc. may be given.
- v) Finally Jute bundles would be covered by the polythene sheet.
- vi) Sand bags would be used as weighing material.
- vii) Banana stems, Soil etc. should not be used under any circumstances.

Extraction of Jute Fibre

The retting stack (JAK) should be checked by the beneficiary on regular interval. When retting of Jute Fiber is completed, extraction of Fiber would be done by the beneficiary.

This year 40 numbers of demonstration were presented in our project area. All the demonstrations were organized by Vikas Kendra and supported by Agriculture Marketing Department, Govt. of West Bengal.

Report on HARITAKI, BAHERA & BAEL Campaign Programme

The West Bengal State Medicinal Plants Board was set-up in the year 2002 and is functioning under the control of the National medicinal Plants Board. Realizing the resurgence of Indian traditional medicines across the world and corresponding increase in demand of medicinal plants, Society for Equitable Voluntary Actions (SEVA) with the financial assistance and design of West Bengal State Medicinal Plant Board started its journey with **HARITAKI**, **BAHERA & BAEL** CAMPIGN PROGRAMME throughout the North 24 Parganas District of West Bengal.

Society for Equitable Voluntary Actions (SEVA) is working since the year 1985 (Registered under WB Societies Registration Act on 1986) and having expertise in Women Empowerment, Agriculture, Livelihood and Public health. The programs

implemented by SEVA not only ensured proper nutrition to adolescents, pregnant women, lactating mothers, infants and school going children but also helped in community mobilization, bringing back the out of school and drop out children, accelerate children's learning through quality education, bridging the gaps in accessing services of government health care providers and ICDS, land/water development and management and humanitarian assistance to the people.

In order to ensure program quality, there are separate programs to cater to specific groups and institutions. SEVA developed two projects one is Vikas Kendra located at Atghara Village of Baduria Block under North 24 Pargans District and the other is Manab Jamin located at Mirzapur Village of Bolpur-Sriniketan Block under Birbhum of West Bengal, India.

The objective of Sishu Vikas Kendra (SVK) is to impart pre-primary education to the distressed rural children and upgrade them mentally and to be able to sustain educational pressure for the next higher classes.

After completing pre-primary education, we take them for admission in the nearest primary school and private missionary schools. This year 10 children were enrolled in the local primary school.

We took up the work of Child Development Centre not as a base point of education but as the platform to start with building mental set up to hold basic responsibilities. Keeping it in view, our teachers are advised in taking care of SVK children and they are doing their best in doing so and at the same time developing hearty relationship between local youth and our centres. They arrange monthly meeting with the mothers and also other programmes for them.

Guardian Meeting

Monthly meeting of guardians with the guardians of SVK children is a very important step in this direction. During this year 12 guardian meeting took place in our SVK Centre. Subjects discussed in the meetings were on Child Care, Food & Nutrition, Kitchen Garden, Family Planning, Immunization, Discipline, First Aid, Utility of Medicinal Plants, Importance of Cleanliness and Child Education. WOMEN HELP LINE

The Central Government has introduced Help Line or help phone in West Bengal to assist the helpless and endangered women.

The 24 hours help phone has been introduced in Kolkata & its surrounding areas. If women are in danger on the road this phone may be of great help to them. The people of voluntary organization will come forward to help the endangered & helpless women if the scheduled numbers are dialed. The arrangement for taking legal action by law & the police will also be available in this regard & all the expenditures are borne by the Human Resource Development Department of the Govt. of India. The Help Line numbers of the voluntary organisation are 10921, 10922, 10923, 10924, 10925 & 10926. The Help Line number of Kolkata Police is 1091. Women Help Line services started at Vikas Kendra from April 2004, with the toll free number of 10926. The Department of Human Resource Development has directed to handle cautiously, each case in the village area & they are also under the women Help Line scheme. The following issues are under the case of the Department of HRD of Govt. of India

- Any disturbance on road during travelling.
- Victim of Deprivation.
- Emotional problem.
- Social oppression.
- Accidental cause in family.
- Driven away from family relatives.
- Forceful Divorce.

- Inability in returning to family after being released from imprisonment.
- Become homeless due to natural calamity.
- Forced to be engaged in sexual activities illegally.
- Sexually tortured or abuse.
- Without getting any help from family & victim of tension.
- Mentally handicapped / retarded.

Help Line Work Methodology

- Help Line team believes that every person in need who contacts them is important. A woman may call the centre just to ventilate or for any kind of immediate help. Thus each call needs to be attended with due care.
- Help Line is a participatory intervention process of finding solution to individual problems & solutions must not be imposed upon the clients.
- Help Line is a strategy to network with other organizations in order to provide required help to the needy.
- Follow-up is done by making regular calls to referral organization to review the case & by involving allied organizations for keeping personal contact.
- Regular contact is maintained with telephone department to ensure that the telephone lines are in order.
- Regular meetings are organized with resource organizations for updating the data bank for referral services.
- Documentation on the experience of the Help Line.

It is to be ensured that appropriate level of confidentiality is maintained in each case.

When Marginal Farmers & Small Farmers are producing grain in their own field, at that time due to huge production in the market, market price is down and middle men are take the opportunity. To Stop Distress Sale we purchase the grain in that time at market price, from Marginal & Small Farmers. It is under Atghara Consumers' Cooperative Society Limited.

Vikas Kendra came into reality in 1985, during 1st 10 years in fighting Poverty, Ignorance and Apathy, a realization made us to build Dharmogola. It is an old concept to make a common warehouse based on trust and ethics. The concept was that, the village products to be purchased by Dharmagola when the price goes down and when it goes up, the products are to be sold with a better price. Profit will plough back to the producers. It is under supervision of Atghara Vikas Consumers' Cooperative Society Limited.

Atghara Vikas Consumers' Cooperative Society Limited got the registration dated 13.03.2013 from ARCS office, it is under Cooperative Society Registration act.

We have started a Grocery Shop from November'2013. Our Co-operative is gradually gaining ground.

Project BARIS in Kolkata Supported by Japan Water Forum


6 rban flooding is a recurring phenomenon that Kolkata Chaces every year during the monsoon. Climate change is likely intensifying the problem with a combination of more intense local precipitation, flooding in Hooghly & coastal storm surges which can lead to widespread and severe flooding that can bring the city to a standstill for a few days. Kolkata has 2,011 registered, and 3,500 unregistered slums. More than a third of the population of Kolkata resides in slums. The increasing population pressure, dense urban environment and low coping capacity of population living in slums make these wards some of the most vulnerable parts of the city. This arises not only from deficiencies in physical infrastructure but also from problems with land-use, socioeconomic and environmental factors. With BARIS, slum dwellers learn difference of bad & good practices by watching & discussing projected Water Disaster Resilience images taken in their own context, presented by people from their own slums, explained in their own language & also develop knowledge about resilience Maps. Under BARIS project the selected kids of Kolkata will expand skills, build upon strengths and directly connect with the civic authorities Water Disaster Resilience practices. SEVA about unsafe developed particular tools for effective participation of Kids to take up the right kind of assignment, purposeful work that increases the citizen's participation and involvement.

With this objective the team of the Administrative Office of SEVA started the work of Project Baris initially from January, 20I5 to May, 20I5 in the slum areas of Dr. Ambedkar Colony and Rajabagan Lane of Baranagar Municipality, Kolkata-700035 and the process is still going on.

Outcomes of the project:

- I. 200 Kids from 2 Slums got ToT on ICT based Mobile Journalism on Eco-WaSH and Disaster Resilience Issues
- II. Kids are using ICT platforms of Digital Storytelling, Mobile Editing, Cinema Verité, Community News, Fiction Film, Video Blogging, Music Video
- III. They have learnt to empower the poor to speak out, challenge the status quo, share knowledge and solutions for positive change which would lead to a call to action from within the community with localized and actionable information.



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MANAB JAMIN

anab Jamin a project of Society for Equitable Voluntary Actions (SEVA) has completed nearly 18 years of service for developmental work in Bolpur-Sriniketan block of Birbhum district of West Bengal. SEVA has tirelessly and persistently facilitated the staff members of Manab Jamin to grow and keep the developmental work going on.

Manab Jamin is now working in 2blocks of Bolpur Sub-Division. These are Bolpur-Sriniketan Block and Illambazar Block.

The project area is rain-fed mono-cropped area and located at arid zone where the land is undulating consisting of Red Laterite and Vindhya Alluvial soil. Rain is very unpredictable and it does not come when it is needed the most and comes when it's not expected. The temperature reaches to 46° C in the summer and drops down to 7° C in winter. Manab Jamin is largely working with Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribe and under privileged section of people just to make the place better to live in.



Commercial Vegetable Cultivation Organically

This is one of the important programmes of income generation for the SHG women. The women had been trained on organic cultivation of vegetables. The women had sold their products at the local market. During this year, Manab Jamin had organized 5 numbers of demonstration at Binuria, Ramchandrapur, Ballavpurdanga and Kankutia. Three types of seed had been distributed for this programme.

Kitchen garden

Kitchen Garden is one of the important programmes of Manab Jamin. The idea of this programme is to propagate the home stead kitchen garden which is the source of nutritional supply of the family as well as secondary source of earning. This year, 7 types of vegetable seed had been distributed at Laksmipur village of Illambazar Block. This year, 56 numbers of kitchen garden had been promoted.

Papaya Seedling Distribution

Papaya is considered as a fruit as well as one vegetable which contains good medicinal values. During this year 2000 papaya seedlings had been raised at the Manab Jamin campus to increase the food and nutritional status of the people; 831 numbers of papaya seedlings had been distributed among 25 primary schools, individual villagers, SHG members and ECO-group members. In addition to consumption, the villagers also made some income by selling papaya in the local market.

Social Security Programme for Unorganized Sector

Manab Jamin had organized different trainings for unorganized sector labourers with the help of Central Board for Workers' education on social security programme. As a part of training, Manab Jamin members facilitated the villagers to open the account under the social security programme i.e. SASPFW (State Assistant Schemes for Provision of Future), and Transport Workers' welfare schemes.

For the benefit of unorganized workers engaged in Transport, Manab Jamin implemented the scheme of West Bengal Transport Workers Social Security Scheme through West Bengal State Social Security Board, Labour Department, Govt. of West Bengal. The scheme is applicable to all unorganised workers engaged in transport work used for commercial purposes namely cars, taxies, luxury taxies, light commercial vehicles, vans, auto-rickshaws, tempos, lorries, trucks, bus, etc or other than those solely owned by an individual for his/her personal and/or family use. This year 21 beneficiaries enjoyed the benefit of the scheme. The age limit of Transport Workers' welfare schemes is 18 to 60 years. ₹30/- is to be deposited at the time of opening along with relevant documents against which a receipt will be issued by the office.

During this year, 24 numbers of villagers had registered under this schemes.

Manab Jamin has also facilitated the social assistance schemes for the benefit of unorganized sector labourers with the help of Labour Department, Govt. of West Bengal. The name of the Scheme is State Assisted Scheme of Provident Fund for Unorganised Workers (SASPFUW). The subscribers who are involved in the self employment occupation and work at unorganized industries may get the benefit from this scheme. Through this scheme, the subscriber deposits ₹25/- per month and matching contribution of Govt. of WB is ₹30/-. This year, 87 nos. of villagers under 14 villages have been benefited by the scheme of SASPFUW. All Identity cards of the registered beneficiaries under SASPFUW have been distributed.

Training for Scheduled Tribe Unorganised Labour

During this year, two numbers of training programmes had been organised with the support of Central Board for Worker's Education, Asansol Regional Office at two villages Amradanga of Raipur Supur Gram Panchayet and Pearsonpalli of Ruppur Gram Panchayet of Bolpur Sriniketan Block. The objective of this training is to make a bridge between the under privilege section of the community and Government offices and to explain how the villagers can access and benefitted from the different govt. schemes.

Assistant Labour Commissioner of Bolpur Regional Office, Branch Manager, UCO Bank, Raipur-Supur villagers and Inspector BCW spoke on different schemes. There had also been discussion on the availability and accessibility of different schemes and programmes for unorganized sector labour. The programme covered 80 families of three villages.

Training for Scheduled Caste Unorganised Labour

During this year, two numbers of training programmes had been organised with the support of Central Board for Worker's Education, Asansol Regional Office at Manab Jamin Mirzapur office. The objective of this training was to make a bridge between the under privilege section of the community and Government offices and to explain how the villagers can access and benefitted from the different govt. schemes.

Assistant Labour Commissioner of Bolpur Regional Office, Branch Manager, UCO Bank, Raipur-Supur villagers and Inspector BCW spoke on different schemes. There had also been discussion on the availability and accessibility of different schemes and programmes for unorganized sector labour. The programme covered 80 families of 8 villages under Manab Jamin Project area.

Special awareness programme for Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme for Unorganized Labour

Two numbers of 2-days' special awareness programme for MGNREGA for unorganized sector labour had been organized with the support of Central Board for Worker's Education Centre, Asansol Regional Office. 80 villagers from two villages namely Surul and Nurpur had participated in this programme Assistant Labour Commissioner of Bolpur Regional Office, Branch Manager, IDBI Bank, Bolpur and Minimum Wages Inspector, Inspector BCW spoke on different schemes. There had also been discussion on the availability and accessibility of different schemes and programmes for unorganized sector labourer.

Special awareness programme for Women Unorganized Labour

Two numbers of 2-days' special awareness programme for

Women unorganized sector labour had been organized with the support of central Board for Worker's Education Centre, Asansol Regional Office. 80 women from seven villages of Manab Jamin project area participated in this programme. Assistant Labour Commissioner of Bolpur Regional Office, Inspector BCW spoke on different schemes in these programmes. There had also been discussion on the availability and accessibility of different schemes and programme for unorganized sector labour.

Self Help Group

Self Help group is one of the major programmes of Manab Jamin. At present, total number of SHG under Manab Jamin are 72. Among them 64 groups are for women and rest 8 are for men. There are 750 members in all the Self Help Groups. There are 166 ST members, 344 SC members, 12 underdeveloped, 109 minority and 119 general members who are engaged in these groups.

All SHG have opened the bank accounts in scheduled bank. The members have deposited their contribution at the schedule bank and take loan from the scheduled bank.

The members of SHG have taken loan from their own contribution as well as from scheduled bank for small business, poultry, animal husbandry, house repairing, handicraft work, treatment for illness, child education etc.

The SHG members are engaged in different income generation programmes like as Batik, Kantha-stich, leather work, plantation, livestock, mushroom cultivation, etc.

EDUCATION

Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra (MJSK)

anab Jamin has completed 18 years of its work at the backward areas of Birbhum District, West Bengal. The area is mainly inhabited by the members of Schedule Caste and Schedule Tribe. The members of this society are basically agricultural labourer and they go out for work in the morning leaving young children in the hands of their older ones. The older children are expected to perform all the household

activities during the daytime. The situation becomes acute during the time of sowing and harvesting when the demand for agricultural labour increases. We found that the rate of absence increased during agriculture season. The project of Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra has been designed to cater the educational needs to the children between the age group of 3-5 years. At present 6 MJSK are running at 6 villages under Manab Jamin Project Area where 166 numbers of children are studying. The details are given in a table as following:

The children are getting nutritious food regularly. Mothers meetings had been held at their schools on bi-monthly basis where they discussed about the progress of the children. We keep records of weight and height of the children in their individual files at 3 months interval. At the end of the session, the teachers of MJSK took the initiative for admission of the children at the local primary school. MJSK In charge visits the school regularly.

Mothers Meeting

Every mothers' meeting is very important to maintain liaison with guardians/mothers of MJSK children. These meetings are held on every 2 months interval in each MJSK. Discussions on child care, child education, kitchen garden, food & nutrition, immunization, family planning, rules & regulation of the MJSK, health & hygiene, ICDP, etc. are also organized. This year, 33 numbers of mothers' meetings had been organized at six numbers of MISK

Committee Meeting

Every MJSK has own local committee to look after the smooth functioning of the Unit. The committee members meet once in every quarter. There have been discussions on admission of new children in MJSK, admission of old children at local primary school, collection of childrens' contribution, solution of local problem related to MJSK. This year, 14 numbers of committee meeting had been organized at six numbers of MJSK

Home Visit

Home Visit is an important tool to run MJSK. All the teachers of the MJSK had visited the children's houses once in every week. Rapport building has grown up between the teacher and parents as well as family members of the children through the Home-Visit. They have personal interactions with the family members on kitchen garden, seed distribution, SHGs, health check up of children, queries about irregularity of children

attendance and information about the mothers' meeting etc

Education Support programme

This is a regular programme of Manab Jamin where text books are distributed among students of scheduled caste, scheduled tribe, other backward class and economically weaker sections under Manab Jamin Project Area. During this year, 54 students from 20 villages got textbooks, who are studying in Class XII. 45 students from 12 villages had got textbooks, who are studying in class XI. 27 students from 10 villages had got textbooks, who are studying in class IX &X.

SANITATION

BARIS - ECO-WaSH Literate Model Villages

This year, Manab Jamin had started to work on BARIS - Eco-WaSH Literate Model Villages at 10 selected Scheduled Tribe predominant Villages under 9 different Gram Panchayets of Bolpur-Sriniketan Community Development Block With the help of National Council for Science & Technology Communication, Department of Science & Technology to be in operation for the period from January 2016 to December, 2017. The objectives of this programme are:-

- Explore indigenous innovative techniques of SC&T Communications on ECO-WASH;
- Develop experimental methodologies of sensitization and of information services concerning the use of Eco-WaSH for developing Model Villages;
- Attitudinal change of villagers on modern technologies for safe hygiene and water purification practice.

More people practice open defecation in India than anywhere in the world – more than 600 million individuals. Although access to improved sanitation is steadily increasing in India since the year 2000 the pace of change is too slow. If the current trend continues, India will miss the Millennium Development Goal (MDG) target for sanitation, and without India the world will not be able to achieve its targets. Clearly accelerating access to and use of toilets and hygiene practices have become a national priority for India. Improved sanitation is not prioritized in many households and the links between open defecation and common diseases, including diarrhea are not understood. Practicing open defecation creates an environment where disease transmission takes place.
