Introduction

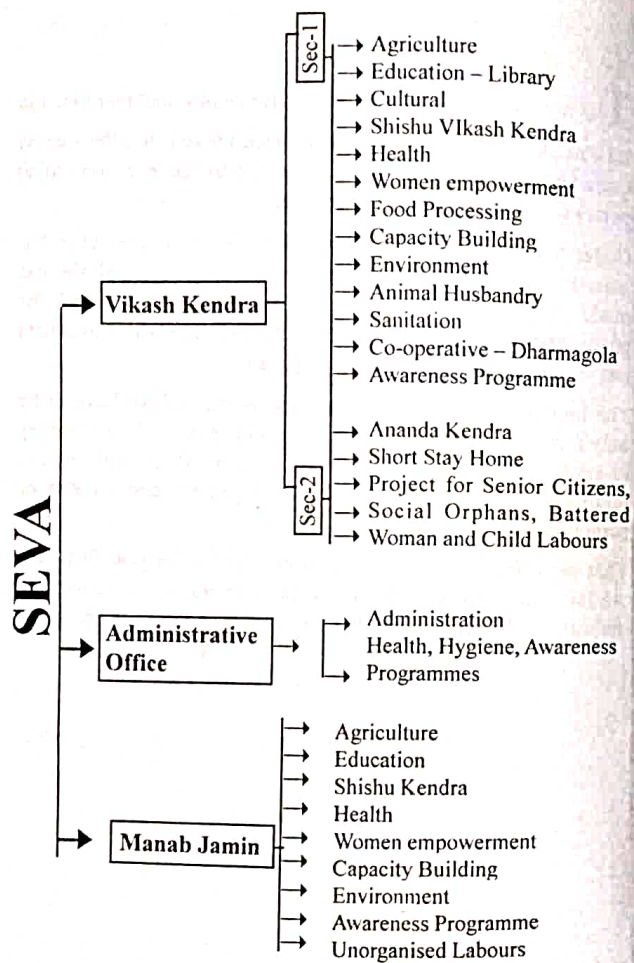

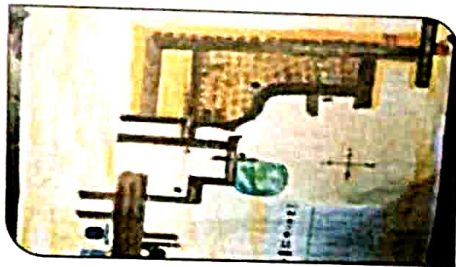

VIKAS KENDRA

Annual Report' 2016-17

Vikas Kendra, the initial project of SEVA, started its journey in the year 1985 and for the last 32 years Vikas Kendra is working in the fields of Agriculture, Health, Education, Women Empowerment, Environment, National Integrity, SHGs etc based in Baduria and also in the surrounding three blocks in the district of North 24 Parganas with various government and non-government agencies.

AGRICULTURE

There are total 679 farmers (in 169.83 ha. land) who are under agreement with us to produce jute, vegetables and field crops using only Organic manures and Organic pesticides to eradicate diseases caused due to inorganic pesticides. They are spread over 17 villages in Baduria and Deganga Block. Out of these farmers some are engaged in producing Phospho-compost, Vermi-compost, Liquid manure, Green manure for their own use. All the organic farmers are also engaged in making organic pesticides under our direction and guidance.

NUTRITIONAL GARDEN

This is similar to kitchen garden. In all the kitchen gardens only organic fertilizers are used. This year 350 families of Ranaghat II block have received from us 20 varieties of seeds, seedlings, medicinal plants and fruit plants for their own kitchen gardens.

This method enabled the drop-out school girls to augment their daily intake of vegetables in their normal meals and some of them also sold a part of produced vegetables and obtained good pocket money. Some ICDS centers made kitchen gardens at their centers, supported by Vikas Kendra and funded by Govt. departments.

1. Organic Jute :

Jute happens to be a major crop for the farmers of West Bengal. Gunnies and other packing materials made out of natural jute fiber are now losing market in the face of synthetic alternatives. As a result the demand of Jute fiber is decreasing day by day. In that backdrop, we are proudly continuing Organic Jute production for the 11th year. Jute fiber produced organically i.e. not using any chemical fertilizers or poisonous insecticides commands a better price in the international market.

This programme was introduced by SEVA along with Ganges Jute Pvt. Ltd. The seeds, package of practice and post harvest measures were supported by CRIJAF. The product is certified by IMO Control, the internationally reputed Certifying Agency. In this year an area of 102.2 ha. has been brought under this scheme.

Gloster Limited adopted a new village Kankarasuti under organic Jute cultivation in collaboration with SEVA. This programme has been launched by Vikas Kendra along with Gloster Limited. An area of 28.27 ha. has been brought under this scheme.

We distributed 500 Kgs. of Jute seed among our 450 number organic farmers supported by Ganges Jute Pvt Ltd. Hoogly and we distributed 150 kgs of Jute seed among 110 new organic farmers supported by Gloster Ltd.

2. Organic Bazaar :

This organic Bazaar programme is functioning since last 15 years. One local Organic Bazaar is running at Atghara on every Monday and Friday to sell produce grown by the registered organic farmers. In addition, Organic Bazaars also have been organized at Pallisri seed corporation office, Kolkata, and Sonarpur Organic Bazaar. The entire organic Bazaar programme is supported by SEVA. Our Eco-volunteers organized this Bazaar programmes.

3. Technology Transfer :

Vikas Kendra developed some Indigenous Technology for the preparation of liquid manure for application on the crops, botanical

pesticides for the control of pest and disease. Those are eco-friendly.

4. Exhibition :

We have conducted "Farmers Day" programme on Organic Agriculture. Dr. Samna, Scientist, CRIJAF, Dr. S. Biswas, ADA, Baduria, Mr. Salim Sahaji. ATM, Baduria and A Rahaman of Vikas Kendra facilitated the programme. We also arranged an Organic Vegetables stall at Titumir Fair. 26 farmers got prize from their exhibits.

19 to 21st January'2017 we attended at Iswarygacha F P School of Baduria Block Agriculture Fair and we displayed and sold Organic vegetables.

We participated in the exhibition organized by Nagarukra Pushpa Mela committee on 31st December'16 to 3rd January'17. 32 organic farmers displayed 56 types of organic vegetables and fruits in the programme. Abdur Rahaman judged these exhibits and also held a farmers meeting. Mr. Abdur Rahaman summed up and made the farmers aware about the purpose of this meeting. We have organised a Farmers' day programme at Nagar Ukra on Organic Cultivation.

We participated in the exhibition organized by Bhanderkona Milon Sangha on 1st to 5th February'2017. 19 organic farmers displayed 32 types of organic vegetables and fruits in the programme. Abdur Rahaman Judged the exhibits and also held a farmers meeting. Mr. Abdur Rahaman summed up and made the farmers aware about the purpose of this meeting.

Farmers Awareness Meeting/Training :

We organized 18 meeting/trainings for farmers on Jute retting, Land preparation, Intenal Inspection, Use of CRIJAF Sona, Use of IJIRA Subhara, Vermi compost making, upgrading of organic agriculture, Bio-pesticide making, Crop planning and future of organic jute.

6. FARMERS' DAY PROGRAMME

On 15.12.16 Abdur Rahaman and 35 ST Farmers went to CRIJAF, Nilgang to attend farmers' day programme cum exposure visit.

On 15.03.17 Abdur Rahaman, 50 ST & General Farmers went to CRIJAF, Nilgang to attend Seed Day programme to train ourselves on seed production, discussed by a group of scientists.

7. ACTIVITIES AT OUR OWN PREMISES :

- AEC: - The 3acre land is being successfully used to produce various organic vegetables by adopting relay cropping method. 140 mango plants are bearing fruit in this year at AEC campus.
- Some quantity of Areca Nut and Bay Leaf were sold from the campus collecting Rs. 13500/-.
- The fruit garden at Vikas Kendra earned an income by selling fruits for Rs. 30000/-

8. DISTRICT AGRI MARKETING DEPARTMENT

Vikas Kendra this year made 06 numbers of Traditional Gola structure and 07 numbers of Pakka Chatal in the house of the farmers and distributed 10 numbers of Van in our Project area with the help of Agriculture Marketing Department of Govt. of West Bengal. The Agriculture Marketing Department, Govt. of West Bengal also organized one 15 days' residential training programme at Netaji Farmers' Training Centre, Tarakeswar, Hooghly. Our Vikas Kendra Mohila Mondali attended that training programme. After the training the Agriculture Marketing Department, Govt. of West Bengal granted Rs. 150,000/- as a support for development of Food Processing Unit. The details are

Enhancement of livelihood security of Paschim Simla & Ghoshpur (North-24 Pgs.) farmers under Tribal Sub Plan (TSP) supported by CRIJAF, Nilgange, Barakpore, organised by Vikas Kendra

Under Tribal Sub Plan (TSP) programme, a series of activities were undertaken with the objective to enhance livelihood security of tribal farmers and farm women through integration of jute and allied fibers based cropping system, livestock and poultry/duck rearing and fishery in North 24 Parganas (Baduria blocks),

Enhancement of Livelihood Security of Tribal Farmers of North 24 Parganas

Paschim Simla Sardar Para Village & Ghoshpur Sardarpara Improved jute production technology and vegetable cultivation : The technological interventions related to jute production like seeds of improved variety, seed drill, nail weeder, balanced fertilizer application and improved retting method using CRIJAF SONA were introduced in Paschim Simla Sardar Para village and in Ghoshpur Sardarpara.

All the farmers who adopted the demonstrated CRIJAF technologies could improve the productivity of jute fiber by 20 percent. Farmers were also provided with technical and farm input support for cultivation of paddy (kharif and rabi), mustard, coriander and potato. Farmers' feedback revealed that the technological interventions were very useful and helped them to increase family income and employment.

Backyard poultry and duckery for economic/nutritional enrichment : The traditional poultry and duckery practiced by the tribal farmers were improved through introduction of more productive breeds of poultry (Vanaraja) and duck (Khaki Campbell). Altogether 72 tribal families were supported by providing 9 chicks of Vanaraja poultry (40 families) and 9 duckling of Khaki Campbell (32 families) in Paschim Simla Sardarpara village (W.B.). Tribal women Self Help Groups were also trained on backyard poultry and duckery. They were supported with chicks, ducklings, starter feed and required vaccines for prevention of Ranikhet disease, IDB, Fowl Pox, and Duck Plague. These interventions could improve the farm income and additional nutritional support (eggs, meat) from poultry and duck rearing.

Tribal Sub Plan programme were taken up by AINP units of BCKV, in the state of West Bengal. In West Bengal, the TSP programme was carried out in 30.66 ha area involving 202 tribal farmers while similarly in Assam, the programme involved 50 farmers covering 10 ha area. The demonstration of new variety JRO 204 along with

use of nail weeder was carried out in North 24 Parganas district of West Bengal. The demonstration of improved production technology (line sowing + weed management) clearly indicated yield advantage of 2.01 - 2.98 q fiber/ha over farmers' practice. The demonstration on improved method of retting using CRIJAF microbial consortium 'CRIJAF SONA' reduced the retting duration by 5-6 days over traditional retting. Similarly, demonstration on improved plant protection technology along with improved production technology in jute recorded Rs. 34,750/ha. additional net return over farmers' practice with additional cost of Rs. 11,250/ha. under demonstration of new jute varieties.

Central Assisted Scheme - Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana (PKVY)

The State Government is very concerned for the last few years over the soil health status due to intensive agricultural practices of the State. In view of this, the State had taken INM programme through various Central and State Programmes to address the major problems of Soil Health Management (SHM). Upon introduction of "Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana (PKVY) " under National Mission on Sustainable Agriculture (NMSA), a Centrally Assisted Scheme, the State Govt. has decided to promote organic farming in the selected districts through this project since 2015-16 with the object of

- Development of organic village through on-farm Natural Resource Management for sustainable and chemical residue free agriculture production.
- Reduction of dependency on fertilizers and agro-chemicals.
- To promote commercial production under organic concept.
- Expansion of area under organic cultivation through PGS certification for development of domestic organic market source for the benefit of farmers.

Government selected 2 clusters (50 farmers each group) - one is Panji and the other is Jangalpur in collaboration with Vikas Kendra.

All the groups were looked after by Vikas Kendra Agriculture Department.

Last year Assistant Director of Agriculture (ADA) , Baduria supported the activity by providing the following materials for Panji & Jangalpur cluster of farmers under PKVY programme.

Model Demonstration-cum-Training programme for awareness about proper retting technology of Jute

Objective :-

- To develop knowledge and skill about proper retting techniques of jute fibre.
- To develop knowledge and skill about grading of jute fiber.
- To disseminate the knowledge and skills to a mass group.

Preparation of Retting Stack (JAK)

- i) Preferably fresh water body may be selected.
- ii) In every jute bundle spraying "IJIRA Subhara" may be inserted for quick & uniform retting.
- iii) Jute bundles may be assorted by traditional way or any convenient way.
- iv) After assortment of Jute bundles, a layer of water plants, small jute plant, water hyacinth etc. may be given.
- v) Finally Jute bundles would be covered by the polythene sheet or used bamboo pieces.
- vi) Sand or mud bags would be used as weighing material.
- vii) Banana stems, Soil etc. should not be used under any circumstances.

Extraction of Jute Fibre :

The retting stack (JAK) should be checked by the beneficiary on regular interval. When retting of Jute Fiber is completed, extraction of Fiber would be done by the beneficiary.

This year 60 numbers of demonstrations were organized in our project area. All the demonstrations were organized by Vikas Kendra and supported by Indian Jute Industries Research Association (IJIRA).The details is given below:

The objective of Sishu Vikas Kendra (SVK) is to impart pre-primary education to the distressed rural children and upgrade them mentally and be able to sustain educational pressure for the next higher classes.

After completing pre-primary education, we take them for admission in the nearest primary school and private missionary schools. This year 10 children were enrolled in the local primary school.

We took up the work of Child Development Centre not as a base point of education but as the platform to start with building mental set up to hold basic responsibilities. Keeping it in point of view, our teachers are advised in taking care of SVK children and they are doing their best in doing so and at the same time developing hearty relationship between local youth and our centers. They arrange monthly meetings with the mothers and also other programmes for them.

Monthly meeting of guardians with the guardians of SVK children is a very important step in this direction. During this year 12 guardian meeting took place in our SVK Centre. Subjects discussed in the meetings were on Child Care, Food & Nutrition, Kitchen Garden, Family Planning, Immunization, Discipline, First Aid, Utility of Medicinal Plants, Importance of Cleanliness and Child Education. All the SVK children along with the teachers participated in the annual picnic held in 28th December/2016. Mothers and committee members also joined the happy occasion. The programme was a source of fun, joy and a feeling of togetherness for the children.

5. Observation of Memorable Days :

Days of National importance and relevance in our life, Independence Day, Republic Day, Netaji's Birth Day, Rabindranath Tagore's Birth Day and Rakhi Bandhan Day were celebrated with great honour and respect.

Titumeer Fair :

Titumeer is the 1st martyr in India's quest for freedom, who sacrificed his life on 19th November, 1831, while defending his Bamboo Stockade. We organize an Annual Fair in his memory and to spread the message of development and national integrity. As martyr Titumeer was son of the soil local population participates in thousands.

On 18.11.2016, 31st Annual Titumeer Fair'16 was inaugurated by Mr. Partho Chkraborty, BDO, Baduria. Economically weaker inmates of Ananda Kendra have got some financial support from this Unit and day by day they are getting efficiency.

SANITATION

It is our continuation programme (2016-17) under "Swachh Bharat Avijan" to make a healthy & hygienic nation. We built 549 numbers of household sanitation unit in the year 2016-17, among the marginal and BPL families in five Gram Panchayets of Baduria Block under our Prime Minister's dream Project "Swachh Bharat Avijan". We have also created awareness among the villagers about the advantage of using toilets. We are proud for our humble contribution to make our District North 24 Parganas as Nirmal District. Our honourable Chief Minister declared our District as Nirmal District at Barasat Rabindra Bhavan (Dated - 29.09.2016). To Stop Distress Sale we purchase the grain in that time at market price, from Marginal & Small Farmers. It is under Atghara Consumer's Cooperative Society Limited.

Vikas Kendra came into reality in 1985, from the realization of the 1st 10 years in fighting Poverty, Ignorance and Apathy, the initiative for Dharmogola was taken. It is an old concept to make a common warehouse based on trust and ethics. The concept was -- when the price will go down the village products to be purchase by Dharmagola, when it will go up products to be sold with a better price. Profit will plough back to the producers. It is under supervision of Atghara Vikas Consumer's Cooperative Society Limited.

Atghara Vikas Consumer's Cooperative Society Limited got the registration dated 13.03.2013 from ARCS office it is under Cooperative Society Registration act.

We have started a Grocery Shop from November'2013. Our Co-operative is gradually gaining ground and it has immense potential to grow further.

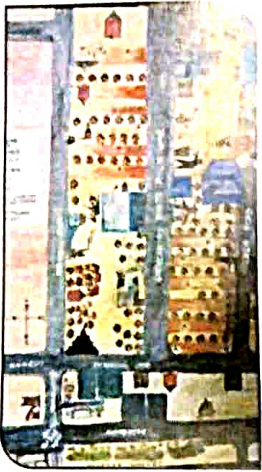

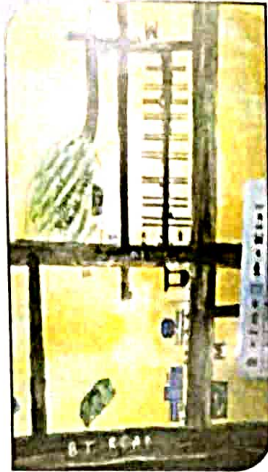

Project BARIS in Kolkata supported by Japan Water Forum

Flood in the urban areas causes a great disruption in the daily city life. Due to water logging roads are blocked; people can't go to work or children to schools. The economic damages are high. The specific cause of urban flooding is lack of proper drainage in urban areas that Kolkata faces every year during the monsoon. Kolkata has many slums, some of them are registered and some are unregistered. Kolkata's slums are highly vulnerable to floods and cyclones due to use of poor construction material, weak social structure and their vulnerable locations. SEVA this year has run a second phase of project "BARIS-Human Resource Development for Water Related Disaster Resilience Adaptation and minimizing vulnerability in Urban Slums with Triggered Information & Knowledge Building".....BARIS selected five slums in Kolkata such as - Chinikuthi, Dr. Ambedker, Rajabagan, Old line, Naya Basti under the Baranagar, Panihati and Kamarhati municipalities. We (BARIS) wanted to develop behavior of people in community mainly through the community children and youth. In BARIS, children learn to use mobile phone as a tool for capturing evidence on routine problems focused during/ after water related disasters.

Kids collect Evidences and Produce the Same in front of community members by means of Movies/ Pictures/ Presentation/ Documentary Film and Fiction Film using Mobile Projectors. Kids organize Shows for small community groups with Mobile Phone accompanied with Projector where the community members not only identify the Wrong Doings but also suggest recovery measures for disaster preparedness. Their voices and videos are recorded with their consent and this also developed Advocacy Documentation for Urban Local Body. After the Show the kids send the evidences to the Mobile Phones of Community Members using Bluetooth Technology in spot or during house to house awareness campaign visits. In this process the documentation are disseminated and spread all over the Slum Community Members, public meeting and also outside the community. Hence the project

is mixing creative thinking of the children to collect the evidence base and motivate adults for policy decision making to adapt the possible water related disasters. Therefore ICT platform is the whole device for sensitization whereas the mobile tools are parts of these devices. With this objective the team of the Administrative office of SEVA started the work of Project BARIS initially from June 2016 to February 2017 in the above mentioned five slums and the process is going on.

Outcomes

- 250 Children and 150 youths of 5 unauthorized Slums of Kolkata got education, awareness and knowledge about Water Related Disaster.
- Changes of the consciousness/atmosphere of communities & structure/recognition/attitude and behavior also.
- Kids & youth are using ICT platforms of storytelling, Mobile Editing, Fiction Film, Video Blogging, Music Video etc.
- Kids are trained for mobile journalism and they are collecting evidences of local problem for advocacy; they are also motivating community to speak out on their rights. Kids prepared fiction film for community motivation. Kids take initiatives to clean area for preventing dengue.

Annual Report of Manab Jamin [2016-17]

Manab Jamin, a project of Society for Equitable Voluntary Actions (SEVA) has completed nearly two decades of developmental works in Bolpur-Sriniketan block of Birbhum district of West Bengal. SEVA has tirelessly and persistently facilitated the staff members of Manab Jamin to grow and keep the developmental works a pace. Manab Jamin is now working at Bolpur-Sriniketan Block and Illambazar Block of Birbhum District.

The project area is rain-fed mono-cropped area and located at arid zone where the land is undulating consisting of Red Laterite and Vindhya Alluvial soil. Rain is very unpredictable and it does not come when it is needed the most and comes when it's not expected. The temperature reaches to 46o C in the summer and drops down to 7o C in winter.

Manab Jamin is working with Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribe and under privileged section of people for the betterment of downtrodden population.

AGRICULTURE

Lentil seed demonstration programme

Lentil is the most ancient cultivated crops among the legumes. It is commonly used for human nutrition, animal feed and soil fertility. Lentil is a long-day plant, neutral types are also available. For this reason harvesting may be done by the end of October and the beginning of March. During this year, 127 numbers of farmers got 600 kgs of lentil seeds and cultivated in 140 bighas of land.

Black Gram demonstration programme

Black gram is important pulse crop. The sowing time of this pulse is August to November. The idea to cultivate Black gram is maximum utilization of land where paddy cannot grow during rainy season and simultaneously increase the soil fertility through nitrogen fixation. This year, 40 kgs of Black gram seed was cultivated in 7.5 bighas of land by 5 farmers of Manab Jamin project area.

Green Gram demonstration programme

Green gram is important pulse crops. The idea to cultivate green gram is to increase the soil fertility through nitrogen fixation. Green gram is sown after harvesting of Rabi crop. The Sowing time is end of February and harvest is in May. The grains are used as a pulse. This year, 140 kgs of Green gram seed had been cultivated in 45 bighas of land by 46 farmers of Manab Jamin project area.

Lathyrus Demonstration Programme

The area is rainfed, mono-crop area. After harvesting of Aman paddy, land is not used for re-cultivation. This year, we motivated 10 farmers of Rajatpur on lathyrus cultivation. The motto of this programme is maximum utilization of land moisture as well as increase the soil fertility to cultivate this crop. The grains are used as pulse.

White Sesame demonstration programme in Rainy season

White sesame is important oil seed. This grain is consumed as oil seed & food item. The sowing time of this oil seed is August to November. The idea to cultivate White sesame is maximum utilization of land where paddy cannot grow during rainy season. This year, 6 kgs of White sesame seed were cultivated in 7.5 bighas of land by 10 farmers of Manab Jamin project area.

White Sesame demonstration programme in Summer season

White sesame, as has already been mentioned, is important oil seed and is also consumed as food item. The sowing time of this oil seed in summer is end of February to May. The idea to cultivate White sesame in summer is maximum utilization of fertilizer used for potato cultivation. All the fertilizers are remaining after harvesting of potato. If the farmers cultivate White sesame after harvesting of potato, then the white sesame can easily be grown within the fertilizer remaining in potato field. This year, 12 kgs of White sesame seed had been distributed among 15 farmers and

were cultivated in 15 bighas of land at Jahanabad village.

Application of Zinc

Zinc is one of the 17 essential elements necessary for the normal growth and development of plants. It is among eight micronutrients essential for plants. Zinc plays a key role in plants with enzymes and proteins involved in carbohydrate metabolism, protein synthesis, gene expression, auxin metabolism, pollen formation, and maintenance of biological membranes, protection against photo-oxidative damage and heat stress, and resistance to infection by certain pathogens.

Zinc deficiency in plants retards photosynthesis and nitrogen metabolism, reduces flowering and fruit development, prolongs growth periods resulting in delayed maturity, decreases yield and quality, and results in sub-optimal nutrient-use efficiency.

Some of the common deficiency symptoms of zinc in plants are light green, yellow or bleached spots in inter-venial areas of older leaves.

Social Security Programme for Unorganized Sector

Manab Jamin has also facilitated the social assistance schemes for the benefit of unorganized sector labourers with the help of Labour Department, Govt. of West Bengal. The name of the Scheme is State Assistant Scheme for Provision of Future (SASPFU). The subscribers who are involved in the self employment occupation and work at unorganized industries may get the benefit from this scheme. Through this scheme, the subscriber deposits Rs. 25/- month and the amount of Rs.30/- is released by the Government as matching contribution. This year 259 villagers of 14 villages have benefitted under the scheme of SUSPFW. All Identity cards of the registered beneficiaries under SUSPFW have been distributed.

Training for Schedule Tribe Unorganised Labour

Training for Scheduled Tribe Unorganised Labour had been organised with the support of Dattapant Thangedi National Board for Workers' Education, Asansol Regional Office at Kantabagan of Kankutia village, under Raipur Supur Gram Panchayet of Sriniketan Block. The purpose of this training was to make a liaison between the under privileged section of the community and Government offices. Minimum Wages Inspector, Bolpur-Sriniketan Block and Inspector BCW spoke on different schemes; programme for unorganized sector labour and explained how to access the programme and get the benefit of govt. schemes. The programme covered 40 families of the village.

Training on Quality of Life

This Year, one Training Programme on Quality of Life was organized with the help of Dattapant Thangeri National Board of Workers' Education, Asansol Regional Office. The purpose of the programme was to elucidate availability and accessibility of different programmes for the wellbeing of the villagers and simultaneously to give the idea on child caring practices in positive way. 20 numbers of couples participated in this programme.

Training for Women Unorganised Labour

Training for women Unorganised Labour had been organised with the support of Dattapant Thangedi National Board for Worker's Education, Asansol Regional Office at one village of Bolpur Sriniketan Block. The purpose of this training was to make a liaison between the under privileged section of the community and Government offices. The Assistant Labour Commissioner, Minimum Wages Inspector, Bolpur-Sriniketan Block and Assistant Director of Agriculture had spoke on different schemes/programme for the women workers of unorganized sector labour and explained how to access the programmes and get the benefit of govt. schemes. The programme covered 240 families of 12 villages.

Refreshers' Training programme for Previous Participants

This Year, One Re-training programme was organized with the help of Dattapant Thangeri National Board of Worker's Education, Asansol Regional Office. The purpose of the programme is to monitor the earlier participants on accessibility of different programmes which was discussed in previous training programme. 60 participants from 10 villages participated in the programme. The Labour commissioner of Bolpur was present in this programme.

Special awareness programme for Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Worker

Three numbers of Special awareness programme for Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Worker had

been organized with the support of Dattapant Thangeri National Board of Workers' Education, Asansol Regional Office. 120 villagers from 9 villages under Manab Jamin Project area participated in this training programme.

The key speakers were Assistant Labour Commissioner, Bolpur Sub Division, Assistant Director of Agriculture spoke on different schemes. There had also been discussion on the availability and accessibility of different Schemes and programme for unorganized labour.

Self Help Group

Self Help Group is one of the major programme of Manab Jamin. At present, total numbers of SHG under Manab Jamin are 77. Among them 62 groups are for women and rest 15 are for men. There have 818 members in all the Self Help Groups. There are 179 ST members, 342 SC members, 15 underprivileged, 145 minority and 137 general members engaged in these groups. All SHG have opened bank account in scheduled bank. The members have deposited their contribution at the schedule bank and taken the loan from the scheduled bank. The members of SHG have taken loan from their own contribution as well as from scheduled bank for small business, poultry, animal husbandry, house repairing, handicraft work, treatment for illness, child education etc. The members of SHG are engaged in different income generation programmes like handicrafts, plantation at the waste land, commercial vegetable cultivation and livestock rearing.

EDUCATION

Manab Jamin Shishu Kendra

Manab Jamin had completed 19 years of services at Bolpur block for the betterment of downtrodden population. The area is dominated by Scheduled Tribe and scheduled Caste population, So the rate of education is very poor among them. To improve the education level, Manab Jamin had started the Pre primary Schools. If the child is acquainted with the school atmosphere before starting the formal school, then it would be easy to cope with school atmosphere after admission in primary school. The children get admission at the age of 3 years.

At present 5 MJSK are running at 5 villages under Manab Jamin Project Area where 131 numbers of children are studying.

Mothers' Meeting

Mothers' meeting had been held at the schools on bi-monthly basis where they discussed about the progress of the children. We keep records of weight and height of the children in their individual file at 3 months interval. At the end of the session, the teachers of MJSK take the initiative for admission of the children at the local primary school. These meetings are very important to liaison with guardians/ mothers of MJSK children. There teachers and women workers hold discussions on child care, child education, kitchen garden, food & nutrition, immunization, family planning, rules & regulation of the MJSK, health & hygiene, ICDP, etc. This year, 29 numbers of mothers meeting had been organized at five MJSKs.

Committee Meeting

Every MJSK have own local committee, to look after the smooth running of the MJSK. The committee members meet once in every quarter. There has been discussion on admission of new children in MJSK, admission of old children at local primary school, collection of children's contribution, solution of local problem related to MJSK. This year, 13 numbers of committee meeting had been organized at 5 numbers of MJSK.

Home Visit

Home Visit is an important tool to run MJSK. All the teachers of the MJSK had visited the MJSK once in every week. Rapport building is grown up between the teacher and parents as well as

family members of the children through the Home-Visit. There have been personal interactions with the family members on kitchen garden, seed distribution, SHGs, health check up of children, queries about irregularity of children's attendance and inform about the mothers meeting etc.

Prof. Sundar Gopal Biswas Memorial Education Support programme

Manab Jamin provided Text book among the poor, needy and economically weaker section community pupil under Manab Jamin project area to increase the education level among the poor & meritorious. This is a regular programme of Manab Jamin where text books are distributed among the students at the beginning of the session in memory of Prof. Sundar Gopal Biswas. This programme was possible to implement for the kind support of Ms. Rajlakshi Biswas.

During this year students from 12 villages got text books; 32 students are from class IX & X, 69 students from class XI & XII, and 18 students are under-graduate.

Barish Eco-wash Model literate villages

More people practice open defecation in India than anywhere in the world - more than 600 million individuals. Although access to improved sanitation is steadily increasing in India since the year 2000 the pace of change is too slow. If the current trend continues, India will miss the Millennium Development Goal (MDG) target for sanitation, and without India the world will not be able to achieve its targets. Clearly accelerating access to and use of toilets and hygiene practices have become a national priority for India. Improved sanitation is not prioritized in many households and the links between open defecation and common diseases, including diarrhea are not understood. Practicing open defecation creates an environment where disease transmission takes place and it is young children in particular who pay the highest price. Over 80% of all deaths due to diarrhea among children under-five years of age are directly attributable to poor sanitation, unsafe drinking water and unhygienic practices. However, most communities do not view diarrhea as life threatening.

SEVA has identified Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe inhabited Revenue Villages under 9 Gram Panchayets of Bolpur-Sriniketan CD Block of Birbhum District according to the nature of vulnerable ECO-WASH practices of the habitations. We have ranked the SC/ST concentrated Gram Panchayets according to the number of concentration of SC and ST in the area. Within the rank of population distribution we have identified 10 villages from 9 Gram Panchayets.
